UCLA Bruins Bowl Notes

*This is UCLA's 35th bowl game

*This is UCLA's 3rd trip to the Bay Area Bowl (also in '11 and '06)

*The Bruins have an overall 16-17-1 record in bowl games

*The Bruins have won the last two bowl games (last season at Alamo Bowl v. K-State and in 2013 Sun Bowl over Va. Tech)

*The last time the Bruins won three straight bowl trips was in the '91 Hancock Bowl, Jan. '89 Cotton Bowl, '87 Aloha Bowl; that was in the midst of UCLA's streak of eight straight bowl wins which began with the 1983 Rose Bowl victory over Michigan

*UCLA's record vs. the Big Ten in bowl games is 7-9 (L Illinois '11 Kraft Fight Hunger; W Northwestern '05 Sun; L Wisconsin '00 Sun; L Wisconsin '99 Rose; L Wisconsin '94 Rose; W Illinois '91 Hancock; W Iowa '86 Rose; W Illinois '84 Rose; W Michigan '83 Rose; L Michigan '81 Bluebonnet; W Ohio St. '76 Rose; W Mich. ROSE BOWL: Home for 34th Year

The 2015 season marked the 34th year that the Rose Bowl, with a seating capacity of 80,616, served as home of the Bruins.

UCLA moved to Pasadena from the L.A. Coliseum in the summer of 1982 and went 6-0-1 in that first year, capping the season with a victory over Michigan in the Rose Bowl game.

The 2006 season-opening win against Utah was UCLA's 100th at the Rose Bowl. The Bruins own a record of 141-64-2 since moving to Pasadena, including a 3-2 record in Rose Bowl games.

UCLA, 37-15 overall under Coach Mora, is 17-8 in games played in the Rose Bowl. The Bruins are 22-9 in the last 31 home contests.

Bruins have won 14 of last 16 games played away from Rose Bowl

Bruins Bowl Bound

— UCLA (8-4, 5-4 and 3rd in the P12 South) will travel to the Bay Area to meet Nebraska (5-7, 3-5 and 4th in the Big Ten West) on Saturday, Dec. 26 at 6:15 p.m. The game will be played at Levi's Stadium in Santa Clara, Calif. Calling the game will be Jason Benetti, Rod Gilmore and Shelley Smith. The Bruin IMG Radio Network (Bill Roth, Matt Stevens and Wayne Cook) will radio broadcast the contest on am570 LA Sports. The game also will be aired on Sirius 80/XM 80, ESPN Radio, uclabruins.com and tunein.com and the TuneIn App.

Bruins to Meet Nebraska at Levi's Stadium in Santa Clara — The series with Nebraska is tied at 6-6. The most recent game was a Bruins win at Lincoln in the 2013 season. Brett Hundley threw three touchdown passes while then No. 16 UCLA wiped out an 18-point deficit to defeat No. 23 Nebraska 41-21. After Nebraska had taken a 21-3 lead, the Bruins scored 35 points in 16 minutes. The barrage started with Paul Perkins' 10-yard touchdown run to cut Nebraska's lead to 21-10 at the half. Jordan James scored from 3 yards out, before Hundley threw TD passes of 28 yards to Shaq Evans, 12 yards to Phillip Ruhl and 3 yards to Nate Iese. The Huskers still looked as if they could come back when, trailing 38-21, they moved from their 25 to the UCLA 12 early in the fourth quarter. But Ameer Abdullah fumbled at the 6 after getting hit by Anthony Barr.

Bruins and the Big Ten — The Bruins own a 48-41-3 all-time record in games vs. teams currently in the Big Ten Conference. The matchup at Nebraska in the 2013 season was the last time the Bruins did battle with a conference opponent. UCLA's all-time record vs. Big Ten teams (Nebraska 6-6; Illinois 6-6; Iowa 7-7, Maryland 1-1, Michigan 3-8, Mich. State 3-3, Minnesota 1-2, Northwestern 3-3, Ohio St. 4-4-1, Penn St. 4-2, Purdue 3-0-2, Wisconsin 7-4).

Bowling — This will be the third time a Bruin team has played in the Bay Area Bowl (2006 L Florida State, 2011 L Illinois). UCLA has played in bowl games in 11 of the previous 13 seasons (not 2010, 2008).

IN BRIEF

**With the win over BYU earlier this season, UCLA has now won 14 of its last 15 non-conference matchups, including 11 straight since a loss to Baylor in the 2012 Holiday Bowl. UCLA has won all 12 regular season non-conference games under Coach Mora.

**UCLA has won 14 of its last 16 contests played away from the Rose Bowl and nine of its last 11 conference road games.

**Jordan Payton moved to the top spot in career receptions at UCLA with a fourth quarter catch at Utah (now 198) moving past Craig Bragg, 2001-04 (193). He tied the school record with 14 catches vs. Wash. St. He has caught a pass in a team-best 28 straight games.

**The Bruin defense has kept Utah, Oregon St. and UNLV out of the end zone this season...The last time UCLA held 3 opponents without a touchdown in a season was in 1988 wins v. Arkansas 17-3, Oregon 16-6, Arizona 24-3 and Long Beach State 56-3.

**Kenny Clark is 2nd on team in sacks (5.0), tackles for loss (9.0) and in tackles (64) and has 3rd-highest total of PBU's on team with five.

**PK Ka'imi Fairbairn, winner of the Groza Award, became the Pac-12's all-time leading scorer after booting a first quarter field goal vs. Wash. St. He is the first player in P12 history to record over 400 points for a career (now 410). Fairbairn has converted 20 of 23 field goals this season. He had a streak of 19 straight this season snapped at Utah (missed 49 yard att.). He has a long of 60 yards vs. Cal.

**QB Josh Rosen established a new school record by throwing 245 pass attempts without an interception (third quarter game 6 at Stanford to 3rd quarter game 12 at USC) -- the old school record was 199 by Drew Olson, 2005.

**UCLA's 5.6 yards per attempted opt. pass and 4.9 yds/play (tied) avg. are best in Pac-12; the 14 sacks allowed is fewest in P12.

**UCLA's total of 14 sacks allowed, is one of the best marks in school history ranking behind only the 1998 team which yielded 13.

**In the last 6 games, Jordan Payton (44-582) and Thomas Duarte (26-472-18.2 avg) have combined for 70 catches for 1,054 yards.

**RB Paul Perkins moved up to third on the school career rushing list. He has scored 31 career touchdowns to move into the school's all-time top 10 on that list and has run for at least 80 yards in 24 career games, including 12/13 contests in 2014 and 9 contests in 2015.

**UCLA's record under Coach Mora from Oct. 12-on in a season is---21-10 (2012: 5-3; 2013: 6-3; 2014: 6-1; 2015: 4-3).

**PK Ka'imi Fairbairn has connected on 41 straight FGs from 35 yards and in and 33 of his last 37 overall FG attempts from any distance.

**Jim Mora's 37 wins over the last 4 seasons equals the school-best total of 37 won by Terry Donahue's Bruins in 1985-88 seasons.

**LB Aaron Wallace has 50 tackles in last 8g...T3rd in P12 at 0.58 sacks/g. Wallace registered career-best 2.5 sacks v. Cal.

**RB Paul Perkins became UCLA's all-time reception leader for running backs during the Wash. State game (now 77).

**Josh Rosen's 410 yards of total offense against WSU was the 9th-best effort ever by a Bruin.

**The Bruins are listed 1st in P12 in pass defense efficiency (111.51), passing yds allowed (205.7) and fewest sacks allowed (1.25/g).

**The Bruins have scored on 40 of last 41 red zone trips; had streak of 30 straight scoring trips stopped on the game's final drive at OSU.

**UCLA established a school record with its sixth 500-yard total offense game of the season vs. WSU: 503 vs. UVA/ 526 at UNLV/506 at Stanford/573 v. Cal/674 at Ore. State/554 v. WSU. The Bruins had five such games in 2014, 1998, 1976, 1973 (records date through 1973)

**Center Jake Brendel upped his school record career starts total to 51 at the USC contest.

**Jaxon Brown's 18 tackles vs. Colorado are the most by a conference player this season...It was the most by a Bruin in a game since Randall Goforth's 19 tackles at Stanford, in 2013..Brown leads the Bruins and is ranked 6th in P12 in tackles (8.0).

**Wash. State had 38 rushing yards, it was the fifth time in the last two seasons UCLA has held oppt. to 80 yards or less on ground.

**Just four seniors are seeing consistent action with the Bruins on plays from scrimmage: RECs Jordan Payton and Devin Fuller, OL Jake Brendel and LB Aaron Wallace --- five more on special teams: PK Ka'imi Fairbairn, P Matt Mengel, LS Christopher Longo, REC Logan Sweet, RB Roosevelt Davis

**UCLA is 26-5 under Coach Mora when scoring first, 11-2 at home; the Bruins have scored first in UNLV, Colorado, Ore. St., WSU, Utah games in '15

**Ka'imi Fairbairn's 60-yard field goal vs. Cal set a school record and was the longest ever in a conference game.

**True Freshmen Played: 2015: 10, 2014: 9, 2013: 18, 2012: 12

**The Bruins are 32-1 under Coach Mora when ahead at the half.

**The blocked punt, at UNLV, by Takkari McKinley was the 14th kick blocked by a Bruin under Coach Mora.

**Ishmael Adams' 96-yard interception return vs. Colorado was UCLA's 11th defensive touchdown scored since 2012.

**QB Josh Rosen was selected as one of five recipients of the 2015 NFF National HS Scholar-Athlete award and C Jake Brendel is a National Scholar-Athlete and was a finalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy -----Both were honored at the December 8 National Football Foundation Annual Awards Dinner in New York.

**Paul Perkins' 219-yard rushing effort vs. BYU was 12th-best in school history and most since Maurice Jones-Drew set school record with 322 yards vs. Washington in 2004... "Perk" was first Bruin to lead conference in rushing since DeShaun Foster-2001. His total of 1,575 yards was 2nd-highest single-season total in school history. Perkins was first Bruin to surpass 2,000-yard rushing mark in first two seasons.

**Ishmael Adams' 96-yard interception return for a score (tied for longest in the P12 this season) vs. Colorado was his third career return for a touchdown, one shy of all-time school leader Alterraun Verner, 2006-09, who now plays with the Tampa Bay Bucs.

**Primarily defensive players have scored 17 touchdowns while playing on offense since 2012.

**Paul Perkins' 121-yard effort vs. WSU was his 11th career 100-yard game which places him T-8th on that all-time UCLA list; he became the eighth Bruin rusher to reach the 3,000-yards gained level during the game against Colorado.

**UCLA has won 27 straight overall games and 46 straight regular season games in which it has held the opponent to less than 20 points (last loss 17-16 to BYU in 2007 Las Vegas Bowl /last regular season loss 16-14 at Colorado 2003).

**Since start of 2012 season, UCLA has won 21 of 23 games (91%) when winning the turnover battle and owns a record of 16-13 (55%) in games when losing or tying the turnover ratio.

**Since start of 2012 season, UCLA has won nine out of 10 games in which it has held opponent to under 100 yards rushing.

**Record in alternate units: '12 (Dark Blue) W-Arizona, L-Stanford; '13 (Black) W-Wash., W-Va Tech; '14: (Gray) W-Arizona; '15 (Black) W-Cal, (Black) L-WSU

**This is the third straight season in which UCLA has made an appearance in the Top 10 of the AP poll. The last time it was listed in the AP Top 10 in three straight seasons was over a stretch of the 1984-89 seasons. The last time it played a game when ranked higher than No. 7 was in 2001.

**With the loss at #15 Stanford, UCLA saw its school record win streak in games played away from the Rose Bowl end at 12 and also halted a five-game winning streak over ranked opponents (#14 Arizona, #24 USC, #11 Kansas St., #19 BYU, at #16 Arizona)

**The loss at Stanford snapped a seven-game conference road win streak for the Bruins - UCLA won a school best eight straight conference road contests from 1974-75-76 under coaches Dick Vermeil and Terry Donahue and under Coach Red Sanders from 1953-54-55-56.

**With the win at Arizona, UCLA opened a season with four straight victories for the third straight year. It is the second time in school history that a UCLA team has opened up with four straight season-opening wins over a three season stretch. (also '52, '53, '54 under Red Sanders.

**UCLA totaled at least 9 wins in three straight seasons for the first time ever over the previous three seasons (2012-9, 2013-10, 2014-10)

**UCLA is 17-6 in true road games under Coach Mora--'15: 4-2, '14: 5-0, '13: 4-2, '12: 4-2 and 13-5 in regular season P12 road games ('12: 3-1, '13: 3-2, '14: 4-0, '15: 3-2).

**UCLA has posted a 13-7 overall record against ranked opponents under Coach Mora and has won seven of the last eight ... 2015: 4-1 --W @ #18 Utah W #20 Cal, L at #15 Stanford, W at #16 Arizona; W #19 BYU; 2014: 4-1 --W #11 Kansas St., W #24 USC, W #14 Arizona, L vs. #12 Oregon, W at #15 ASU

UCLA HEAD COACH JIM MORA

On December 10, 2011, former Atlanta Falcons and Seattle Seahawks head coach Jim Mora was named UCLA's 17th head coach in school history.

This past season, his Bruins have achieved numerous individual school marks, including kicker Ka'imi Fairbairn becoming the conference's all-time leading scorer, Jordan Payton emerging as the school's all-time leading receiver and freshman quarterback Josh Rosen establishing multiple school milestones. The team has also set a school record for most 500-yard total offense games in a season (6) and kept as many as three opponents out of the end zone in a game for the first time since 1988. In addition, Coach Mora has equaled Terry Donahue's school-best four-year win mark of 37 contests while leading UCLA to a victory in its last 11 non-conference matchups and to a fourth straight bowl appearance.

In 2014, Coach Mora guided the Bruins to the ninth 10-win season in school history, matching the school record for wins in a season. It marked the third straight year in which Mora's Bruins had produced at least nine wins, a first in program history. His 29 total wins are the most-ever by a UCLA coach in his initial three seasons on the job.

Following the victory in the 2015 Alamo Bowl, UCLA had captured wins in 10 straight games away from the Rose Bowl to tie that school record, including a school-best 7-0 slate in 2014. That win was also the team's third over teams ranked among the Associated Press Top 15 at the time of the contest, which was the most by the program since it defeated four such teams in 1952. The Bruins capped off the season ranked No. 10 in the final AP poll which was the highest for the program since 1998.

Linebacker Eric Kendricks, who became the school's all-time leading tackler during the 2014 season, went on to be UCLA's first recipient of the Butkus Award and the second-straight winner of the Lott IMPACT Trophy. Quarterback Brett Hundley set numerous school career records, including bests for most touchdown passes and total offense. Running back Paul Perkins led the Pac-12 in rushing and produced the second-highest rushing yardage total in school history.

In 2013, Mora led the Bruins to the eighth 10-win season in school history, tying the school mark for most wins in a season. UCLA remained in the AP rankings throughout the full 2013 season for the first time since 1998. Linebacker Anthony Barr was selected as a first-team All-America and as the school's first winner of the Lott IMPACT Trophy. A school record 18 true freshmen saw action during the season and seven true freshmen position players started in a game to match that school record. Five Bruins, the most by the program since 2002, were selected in the 2014 NFL Draft, headed by Barr's pick at No. 9 overall by the Minnesota Vikings.

In his first year, Mora guided the Bruins to the 2012 South Division Championship of the Pac-12 Conference and matched the school-record for wins by a first-year coach, with nine. The Bruins, who played in the Holiday Bowl, set numerous offensive records during the course of the 2012 season, including establishing a new school rushing leader, in Johnathan Franklin, and several passing marks achieved by Hundley. On defense, Barr emerged as one of the most dynamic performers in the country in his first season as a linebacker and led the nation in sacks for a good portion of the year. Kendricks led the conference in tackles, ranking 11th in the country. Four players were selected in the 2013 NFL Draft, including defensive lineman Datone Jones in the first round by the Green Bay Packers.

Mora came to UCLA after spending part of 2010 and most of 2011 as a television analyst and contributor for the NFL Network and the NFL on Fox. He brought 25 years of NFL coaching acumen with him to UCLA, including four years of NFL head coaching experience while at the helm of the Atlanta Falcons (2004-06) and the Seattle Seahawks (2009).

Mora took over for Mike Holmgren as head coach of the Seattle Seahawks in 2009. He had served as assistant head coach and defensive backs coach for Seattle in 2007 and 2008. The Seahawks went 10-6 and finished first in the NFC West in the 2007 season and won the Wild Card game. In his initial season as the head coach of the Falcons in 2004, Mora guided the team to an 11-5 record, becoming just the eighth rookie head coach in NFL history to win 11 games and the 11th to bring home a Division title. Atlanta captured the NFC South title and earned an appearance in the NFC Championship game for only the second time in franchise history. Mora was selected as the NFC Coach of the Year.

The Falcon's defense improved from a league ranking of 32nd in 2003 to No. 14 overall the next season, fueled by a league-leading and franchise record 48 quarterback sacks. Atlanta topped the NFL in rushing in all three of coach Mora's seasons as head coach. In 2006, Michael Vick became the first quarterback in NFL history to rush for at least 1,000 yards.

Mora had joined the Falcons from the San Francisco 49ers where he spent seven seasons, from 1997-2003, including the last five as the defensive coordinator. In his first year, the 49ers finished No. 1 in the NFL in total defense, No. 2 in pass defense (with 25 interceptions), takeaways (41) and run defense, as well as No. 3 in the League in sacks (with 54). The 1998 squad tied for No. 1 in the NFC, and No. 4 in the NFL, with 21 interceptions. The 1997 team advanced to the NFC Championship Game, while the 1998 and 2002 squads captured Wild Card Game wins.

Mora worked the previous five seasons (1992-1996) on the staff of his dad, Jim E. Mora, as the secondary coach with the New Orleans Saints. His defensive expertise began to take shape and the Saints boasted the No. 1 pass defense in the NFL during his first two years. In 1985, Mora broke into the NFL coaching ranks with the San Diego Chargers under head coach Don Coryell. He spent seven seasons with the Chargers, advancing from the league's first quality control coach position to defensive backs coach.

Mora began his coaching career in 1984 at the University of Washington. He joined the staff of Don James in the role of defensive assistant following a four-year playing career as a defensive back for the Huskies. While at UW, Mora had the opportunity to be a part of two Rose Bowl teams (1981-loss to Michigan and 1982-win over Iowa) as a player, in addition to helping the Huskies land a berth in the 1985 Orange Bowl (win over Oklahoma) as a graduate assistant. During his five seasons in the Husky program, Washington compiled a 48-12 record, ranked among the nation's top 10 teams on three occasions, and did not finish lower than second in the Pac-10 standings.

True senior **JORDAN PAYTON (#9-Political Science major)** has moved into the top spot on the all-time school reception list and into the third in receiving yards in the game at Stanford. He has caught a pass in 28 straight games.

True junior **THOMAS DUARTE (#18-Sociology major)** appeared in 12 games with seven starts while earning honorable mention all-conference honors in 2014. He caught 28 passes for four touchdowns (2 v. Memphis, 1 vs. USC for 57 yards and Stanford) and led the team with a 19.29 yards per catch average which ranked 15th in the nation and first in the Pac-12.

RUNNING BACKS — PAUL PERKINS (#24-Sociology major) has moved up to third on the all-time school rushing list. He is now the all-time leading receiver at UCLA for running backs.

He rushed for 219 yards against BYU, the 12th-highest total in school history and the most since 2004 when Maurice Jones-Drew racked up a school record 322 yards vs. Washington.

In 2014, Perkins became the first Bruin to lead the Pac-12 in rushing since DeShaun Foster in 2001.

His total of 1,575 yards rushing was the second-highest total in a season ever by a UCLA back. He ranked 15th in the NCAA in rushing yards (1,575), 16th in rushing yards per game (121.2) and 29th in the nation in all-purpose rushing (136.6).

Perkins had six 100-rushing games, topped by a 194-yard performance in the bowl win over Kansas State. He also ran for 190 yards on 22 carries against Oregon and went for 180 yards at Colorado, including a 92-yard scoring run which tied for the second-longest in school history. Perkins recorded his first two scoring receptions in the win at Cal. He was an honorable mention all-conference selection by the coaches. Named Offensive MVP of the Valero Alamo Bowl, Perkins became the first Bruin to rush for more than 2,000 yards in his initial two seasons in the program during the bowl game win.

Perkins saw his first game action in 2013 and made four starts. He ran for scores in games vs. Nevada, at Nebraska, Cal, ASU, USC and Virginia Tech. Perkins ran for 92 yards on 16 carries at Utah and 93 yards on 22 carries at Oregon. He was named honorable mention academic all-conference.

OFFENSIVE LINE — Redshirt senior **JAKE BRENDL (#54-Economics major)**, a team co-captain, was named a finalist for the 2015 Campbell Trophy given to the national football scholar-athlete of the year and the Pop Warner College Football Award. He is also on the 2015 Outland Trophy and Rimington Award Watch Lists and became **UCLA's all-time leader** in games started against Washington State. He was a second-team all-conference performer in 2014 and a first-team Academic All-Pac-12 selection the past three seasons.

Junior guard **ALEX REDMOND (#51-History major)** matched the school mark with 13 starts as a freshman. He joined tackle/guard **CALEB BENENOCH (#74-Political Science major)** to become the first pair of Bruin true freshmen to ever start together on the offensive line in the 2013 game against Cal. **SCOTT QUESSENBERRY (#52-Political Science major)** joined the group to make it the first trio of true freshmen to ever start together on the offensive line at Oregon in 2013. Benenoch has started the last **34** games.

Redshirt junior **CONOR McDERMOTT (#68-Political Science major)** made his first start as a blocking tight end against Oregon in 2014. He then went on to start the last seven games of that season at left tackle. Played on special teams and as a reserve along the offensive line in 2013. McDermott redshirted in 2012.

Redshirt sophomore **KENNY LACY (#76-Political Science major)** saw his first game action last season at Arizona State. He went on to make two starts at guard in home games against Utah and Oregon. Redshirt freshman **KOLTON MILLER (#77-undeclared)** has started three games at tackle.

KICKER — True senior kicker **KA'IMI FAIRBAIRN (#15)**, the Lou Groza Award winner, became the Pac-12's all-time leading scorer after a 22-yard field goal on the opening drive of the game against Washington State and was named a Groza "Star of the Week". He has made 41 straight field goals from 35 yards and in. He also earned Groza "Star of the Week" honors after connecting from 60-yards out against Cal which was the longest field goal in school history and the longest ever in a conference game. It is the tied for the second-longest ever by a conference player. His 53-yard field goal against Arizona State, earlier this season, had tied for the fourth-longest boot in school history.

Last season he became the first Bruin to record three 100-point seasons. Fairbairn has handled all of the Bruin placekicking chores in his first three seasons in the program. He began the 2015 season sixth on the all-time school field goal list and fifth in career scoring.

In 2014, Fairbairn ranked 19th in the nation and third in the Pac-12 with his .818 field goal percentage after connecting on 18 of 22 field goal attempts. He finished the season by converting 13 of his last 14 attempts. His total of 18 made field goals tied for 10th -best on the school season list. Fifty of his 80 kickoffs went for touchbacks.

His 33-yard kick in 2012 at Arizona State, with no time left, provided the winning points in a 45-43 victory. His 104 points scored, rank tied for 11th on the school list and as the most ever scored by a Bruin true freshman.

UCLA IMG Sports Network games are available nationally through an agreement with Sirius XM Satellite Radio, the Official Satellite Radio Partner of UCLA Athletics.

UCLA has produced six quarterbacks — Troy Aikman, Steve Bono, Billy Kilmer, Tommy Maddox, Tom Ramsey, Jay Schroeder — who have played that position on a Super Bowl team.

Quarterback Drew Olson finished eighth in the 2005 Heisman Trophy balloting. It marked the 21st time that a Bruin has finished in the top 10 of the Heisman Trophy voting.

UCLA has had at least one former player participate in 31 of the last 34 Super Bowl games.

The only three-time consensus All-Americans in Pac-10 history are Bruins (LB Jerry Robinson and S Kenny Easley).

Since 2000, UCLA has had 20 finalists / winners of National player awards --- 2015 Ka'imi Fairbairn - Groza Award winner; 2014 Eric Kendricks - Lott IMPACT Award winner; Butkus Award winner; Brett Hundley - Manning Award finalist, Unitas Award finalist; 2013 Anthony Barr - Lott IMPACT Trophy winner, Lombardi Award finalist, Bednarik Award finalist; Myles Jack - Hornung Award finalist; 2012 Johnathan Franklin - Doak Walker Award finalist; 2009 Kai Forbath - Groza Award winner; 2005 Marcedes Lewis-Mackey Award winner; 2004 M. Lewis, Mackey finalist; 2002 Mike Seidman-Mackey finalist; 2004 Chris Kluwe-Ray Guy Award finalist; 2003 Dave Ball-Bronco Nagurski Award finalist; 2001 Robert Thomas-Dick Butkus Award finalist; 2000 Freddie Mitchell-Fred Biletnikoff Award finalist; 2003 D. Ball-Vince Lombardi Award finalist; 2006 Justin Hickman-Ted Hendricks Award finalist; 2003 D. Ball-Ted Hendricks Award finalist; 2003 D. Ball-Chevrolet National Defensive Player of the Year Award.

On May 13, 2007 UCLA became the first school in history to win 100 NCAA team championships. The Bruins currently have 113 NCAA titles to their credit (winning Men's Water Polo in 2015).

BAY AREA BOWL GAMES: A LOOK BACK



Game Notes - UCLA dropped a 20-14 verdict to Illinois in the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl in San Francisco. After a scoreless first quarter, the Bruins jumped out to a 7-0 lead on a 16-yard scoring toss from Kevin Prince to Taylor Embree. The Bruin defense held the Fighting Illini to a field goal on the final drive of the first half, after the Big Ten squad had a first-and-goal from the Bruin five-yard line. After the teams traded missed field goals, the Illini intercepted a Prince pass and returned it for a touchdown in the final minute of the third quarter to take a 10-7 lead. The Illinois offense then scored on its next two possessions, adding a field goal, early in the fourth quarter, and a touchdown on a long scoring pass, for a 20-7 lead with 5:32 to play. The Bruins

answered by driving 84 yards on nine plays to score on a Prince to Nelson Rosario 38-yard pass with 29 seconds remaining. Illinois recovered the subsequent on-side kick attempt and ran out the clock. Prince finished with 201 yards passing on the day, but the stingy Illinois defense yielded just 18 Bruin yards on the ground. Jordan Zumwalt and Eric Kendricks led the UCLA defense with 10 tackles each.

Game Notes - In front of a sold out and Bruin-friendly crowd at AT&T Ball Park in San Francisco, the Bruins ended their season with a 44-27 loss to the Florida State Seminoles in the Emerald Bowl. Despite an impressive performance on offense, the Bruins couldn't overcome a 21-0 run by FSU in the fourth quarter, as UCLA was dealt its first loss in four games.

The Seminoles scored first off of a 25-yard touchdown run by Lorenzo Booker, but UCLA scored 10 unanswered points, highlighted by Patrick Cowan's 78-yard touchdown strike to Brandon Breazell, to end the first quarter up 10-7. The UCLA defense held Florida State to just two second quarter field goals, while the Bruins put up 10 more points on an amazing seven-yard touchdown catch by Junior Taylor and a 19-yard field goal by Justin Medlock to head into halftime up 20-13.

The Seminoles opened up the second half with a field goal, then tacked on seven more points after a punt by UCLA's Aaron Perez was blocked and returned 25 yards for a touchdown. UCLA's Chane Moline rushed for an eight-yard touchdown and the third quarter would end with the Bruins up 27-23.

Florida State held the Bruins scoreless in the fourth quarter while scoring 21 unanswered points, capped off by an 86-yard interception return for a score by Tony Carter, as the Seminoles went on to win, 44-27.

In the game, UCLA racked up 434 yards of total offense with Patrick Cowan throwing for 240 yards. Running back Chris Markey broke the 1,000-yard rushing mark with his 144-yard performance. The Bruin defense was led by Alterraun Verner, who equaled his career-high with nine tackles.

KENNEDY POLAMALU

Running Backs

2nd Season

USC '87

Kennedy Polamalu was hired as running backs coach, on UCLA Head Football Coach Jim Mora's staff, during December 2013 and coached his first game during the 2013 Hyundai Sun Bowl. A long-time collegiate and NFL coach, Polamalu returned to Westwood where he previously served as a graduate assistant coach for the Bruins during the 1992 and 1993 seasons.

"We are thrilled to have a man and coach of Kennedy's stature joining the Bruin Family," said Mora at the time of his hiring. "Kennedy is widely regarded as one of the finest football coaches in America, and our student athletes will benefit not only from his coaching but also his mentorship."

In 2015, Paul Perkins became the first Bruin to record back-to-back 1,000-yard rushing seasons since DeShaun Foster in 2000-01. He also became the first Bruin running back to catch at least 70 passes in a career. Perkins, third on the all-time school rushing list, was named second-team all-conference and ranked among the nation's top 20 in rushing yards. He had a career-high 219 yards against BYU, the most by a Bruin back since 2004 and the 12th-most in school history. Three running backs in all cracked the 200-yard mark for the season.

In the 2014 season, Polamalu's unit produced the leading rusher in the Pac-12 Conference who totaled the second-highest rushing yard total in school history (1,575 yards). Perkins also became the 13th back in school history to reach the 1,000-yard rushing milestone. He was the first Bruin runner to register at least 2,000 rushing yards (2,148) in his first two seasons of action.

A four-year letterman (1982-85) as both fullback and linebacker at USC, Polamalu was the Trojans offensive coordinator and running backs coach from 2010-12 in his second stint with the team. During his first tenure as an assistant coach at his alma mater from 2000-03, he served as running backs coach (2000), special teams coordinator (2001) and running backs coach & special teams coordinator (2002, 2003). From 2004-09, Polamalu worked in the NFL ranks as Tennessee Titans running backs coach following the 2009 season, Jacksonville Jaguars running backs coach (2005-09) and Cleveland Browns running backs coach (2004-05). While in Jacksonville, both Fred Taylor (2007) and former UCLA great Maurice Jones-Drew (2009) earned Pro Bowl honors as the Jaguars offense totaled the third-most rushing yards in the NFL over that time, including four Top 10 rushing finishes. In 2009, Jones-Drew finished fourth in the NFL in rushing (1,391 yards), fourth in scrimmage yards (1,765) and second in total touchdowns scored (16). In 2008, Greg Jones became the highest paid fullback in NFL history.

Polamalu also previously served as an assistant coach at San Diego State (1999, 1994-96) and Colorado (1997-98). While with the Bruins as a graduate assistant coach (1992-93), he worked with the secondary and special teams and helped the 1993 team to a Rose Bowl berth.

Beginning his coaching career as a volunteer assistant at Crespi High in Encino (Calif.) for three seasons (1986-88) and then at Westlake High in Westlake Village (Calif.) for three more seasons (1989-91), Polamalu helped lead his team at Crespi to the 1986 CIF Division I championship.

Polamalu, who earned his bachelor's degree in history from USC in 1987, attended Mater Dei High in Santa Ana, Calif., where he was a prep All-American in football, member of the basketball and track teams and also served as the student body president.

Polamalu's family football tree is extensive. His nephew, Troy Polamalu, currently stars in the NFL with the Pittsburgh Steelers; his brother, Ao Polamalu, played football at Penn State (1985-87); his nephew Nicky Sualua played running back in the NFL with Dallas and Cincinnati after attending Ohio State; and three other nephews played college football (Leie Sualua - Oregon, Joe Polamalu - Oregon State and Kaio Aumua - UTEP).

Hawai'i/Excelsior College '08

Former NFL offensive lineman and three-time Super Bowl winner Adrian Klemm joined the Bruin staff in December 2011, after coaching four seasons at SMU, and has quickly established himself as one of the top o-line coaches and recruiters in the nation. In February of 2014, he was elevated to Associate Head Coach. The top two single-season rushing performances in school history have run behind coach Klemm's lines. His O-line recruiting class for 2015 was ranked as the best in the nation.

In just a few short weeks in Westwood, Klemm helped the Bruins bring in one of the nation's top classes for 2012 and was named the Pac-12 Recruiter of the Year by 24/7 Sports. He followed it up by bringing in one of the nation's top groups in 2013 and was tabbed by Rivals.com as one of the nation's Top 25 recruiters.

Klemm's O-line ranked first in the Pac-12 in fewest quarterback sacks allowed in 2015 (1.25) which ranked 19th in the nation. Paul Perkins became the first Bruin running back to eclipse the 1,000-yard mark in back-to-back seasons since DeShaun Foster in 2000-01 and he moved up to third on the all-time school rushing list. Jake Brendel, who became the first Bruin to start at least 50 games, and Conor McDermott each earned second-team all-conference honors.

In 2014, his unit helped produce the leading rusher in the Pac-12 Conference, who totaled the second-highest rushing yard total in school history (1,575 yards). Perkins also became the 13th Bruin to reach the 1,000-yard milestone and the first to achieve the 2,000-yard mark in his first two seasons of action. Brendel earned second-team all-conference and first-team academic all-conference honors. Caleb Benenoch, Alex Redmond and Scott Quessenberry were each named honorable mention all-conference selections. McDermott developed into a player to watch at tackle. Malcolm Bunche signed with the Philadelphia Eagles.

In each of his first two seasons, one of his Bruin linemen was chosen in the NFL Draft. Xavier Su'a-Filo's selection with the first pick in the second round in 2014 was the highest for a UCLA offensive lineman since the Baltimore Ravens tabbed Hall of Famer Jonathan Ogden with the No. 4 overall pick in 1996.

In 2013, Su'a-Filo earned the Morris Trophy, in a vote of the Pac-12 defensive linemen, as the top offensive lineman in the league. Brendel earned honorable mention all-conference recognition and first-team Pac-12 All-Academic team accolades. Redmond was tabbed for Freshman All-America post-season honors.

In his first season on the field with the Bruins, his offensive linemen helped pave the way for record-setting running back Johnathan Franklin. New school rushing records were established in 2012 for most rushing yards by a back in a season, most rushing yards by a back in a career, most all-purpose yards in a season, most all-purpose yards in a career and most 100-yard rushing games in a season. Senior guard Jeff Baca was selected in the 2013 NFL Draft. Su'a-Filo earned first-team all-conference honors and second and third-team All-America acclaim from several publications. In addition, center Brendel, tackle Torian White and tackle Simon Goines were recognized on Freshman All-America teams.

A four-year starter as a player at the University of Hawai'i, Klemm began volunteering with the SMU program in 2008 after spending seven seasons in the NFL and winning Super Bowls (XXXVI, XXXVII, XXXIX) as a member of the New England Patriots. He made an immediate impact at SMU, quickly emerging as one of the nation's top recruiters and helping coach June Jones produce his first 1,000-yard rusher.

In 2011, SMU featured the nation's seventh-leading rusher in Zach Line (122.4 yards per game). Two Mustang offensive linemen went on to be selected in the 2012 NFL Draft - Josh LeRibeus in the third round by the Redskins; Kelvin Beachum, in the seventh round by the Steelers. Line has played with the Vikings.

On the field in 2010, Klemm tutored a young SMU line and guided Beachum to first-team All-Conference USA honors. He also led J.T. Brooks and Blake McJunkin to honorable mention all-conference accolades. His line helped the SMU offense set school records in total offense, passing yards, passing touchdowns and first downs among others. Line finished the season with 1,494 rushing yards, the second-best single-season total in school history, trailing only Eric Dickerson's 1982 effort.

Following the 2010 season, Klemm was named the top non-BCS AQ Recruiter in the nation by Rivals.com, and was further recognized by the outlet as one of the Top 25 recruiters in the country. Other services took note as well, as FoxSports/Scout.com named him the Conference USA Recruiter of the Year. Following this success, Klemm was named SMU's Recruiting Coordinator in the summer of 2011.

In 2009, Klemm helped Beachum earn second-team all-conference honors. The line blocked for an offense that passed for a then-school record total of 3,666 yards and produced the first collegiate 1,000-yard rusher under coach Jones.

After a standout playing career at Hawai'i, Klemm was the 46th overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft. He played under Jones during his senior season (1999), and was a part of the biggest turnaround in NCAA history, as Hawai'i improved from 0-12 to 9-4 and won a bowl game that season. Klemm was selected as a starting left tackle at the Senior Bowl and also received invitations to the Hula Bowl and the East-West Shrine Game. He attended Saint Monica HS in Santa Monica, CA.



NOEL MAZZONE

Offensive Coordinator

4th Season

New Mexico '80

Noel Mazzone (pronounced Muh-ZONE-ee) joined the Bruin staff in January of 2012 after working as the offensive coordinator at Arizona State in the 2010 and 2011 seasons. His impressive coaching resume includes time as an assistant coach in the NFL and as an offensive coordinator in the Atlantic Coast, the Big Ten, the SEC and the Pac-12 Conferences.

UCLA set a school record for most 500-yard total offense games in 2015 with six. Quarterback Josh Rosen, the Pac-12 Offensive Freshman of the Year and a Freshman All-America selection, set numerous school passing records and ranked among the nation's top 25 passers in completions per game (22nd), passing yards (19th) and passing yards per game, (21st). He also established a new school mark with 245 passing attempts without an interception. Receiver Jordan Payton became UCLA's all-time leading receiver. Devin Fuller moved up among the top six on that all-time receptions list and Thomas Duarte shot into the school's top 20 for career receiving yards and top 10 in career TD receptions. Running back Paul Perkins produced the first back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons since DeShaun Foster in 2000-01 and became UCLA's leading running back receiver.

The big numbers kept coming for Mazzone's offense at UCLA in 2014. Brett Hundley became the school's all-time leader in total offense (11,713) and touchdown passes (75). He also was the first UCLA quarterback to throw for at least 3,000 yards in three different seasons. The redshirt junior, who was selected by the Green Bay Packers in the 2015 NFL Draft, ranked fourth in the NCAA in completion percentage (.691) and 13th in passing efficiency (152.7). Perkins led the Pac-12 in rushing and became the 13th Bruin back to reach the 1,000-yard milestone for a season and the first to register at least 2,000 rushing yards (2,148) in his first two seasons of action. His total of 1,575 rushing yards in 2014 was the second-highest in school history. The offense tied the school mark with five games of 500-yard total offense. Receivers Payton (67) and Fuller (59) each ranked among the school's top 10 all-time in single-season catches.

In 2013, the team set school records for total offense (692 yards) and first downs (39) in the New Mexico State contest. A school record 26 players caught a pass during the course of the season. Hundley ranked among the nation's top 25 in completion percentage (14th-.668), passing efficiency (20th-152.9), touchdown passes (23rd-24), points responsible for (14th-216), and total offense (23rd-293.8). Shaq Evans finished his career ranked tied for 10th on the all-time school receptions list and tied for ninth on the single-season touchdown reception list. Hundley also produced the third-most rushing yards by a quarterback in school history.

Mazzone's first season on the field with the Bruins quickly turned into a record-setting campaign. Senior running back Johnathan Franklin established new school marks for career rushing yards (4,403 yards), career all-purpose yards (4,925), single-season rushing yards (1,734), single-season 100-yard rushing games (9) and single-season all-purpose yards (2,062). He was selected in the 2013 NFL Draft by the Green Bay Packers.

Also in 2012, Hundley set records for single-season passing yards (3,740), single-season completions (318) and single-season total offense yards (4,095-fifth on the all-time Pac-12 list). In addition, he became the first UCLA quarterback to throw for over 300 yards in three straight games. Team records were also achieved for most yards in a season (6,531), most points scored in a season (482), most passing yards gained in a season (3,860), most first downs in a season (331) and most points scored in a quarter (30).

In 2011, Arizona State's offense ranked 25th in the nation, averaging 445.8 yards per game. It was ranked 10th in passing offense (316.7 yards per game) and 28th in scoring offense (33.2 points). Quarterback Brock Osweiler ranked 11th in the NCAA in total offense (317.4) and his 4,126 yards ranked third on the all-time Pac-12 list. Running back Cameron Marshall recorded 18 rushing touchdowns and ranked seventh in the Pac-12 in rushing yards per game. In 2010, Arizona State was listed No. 15 nationally in passing offense and No. 29 in total offense. In addition, ASU rushed for 19 touchdowns.

Mazzone came to Arizona State from the NFL after having served as wide receivers coach of the New York Jets from 2006-2008 and working as a personnel consultant for the franchise in 2009. There, he coached wideouts Jericho Cotchery and Laveranues Coles, who set a Jets record for combined yardage and receptions.

Before his time in the professional ranks, Mazzone coached in college football for more than two decades. He tutored quarterbacks, running backs, receivers and tight ends, while also serving as offensive coordinator at three schools (Ole Miss, Auburn and North Carolina State).

In 2005, Mazzone enjoyed a second stint at the University of Mississippi as the offensive coordinator. From 2003-04, he was the offensive coordinator and tight ends coach at North Carolina State. While at NC State, he coached All-American quarterback Philip Rivers (San Diego Chargers), who went on to become the fourth overall pick in the 2004 NFL Draft, and Cotchery, a wide receiver. The Wolfpack offense led the Atlantic Coast Conference in six offensive categories and topped the NCAA in pass efficiency. It ranked third in the NCAA in passing offense and was No. 8 in scoring offense.

In 2002, he was on Dennis Erickson's Oregon State staff as the running backs and spe-

Demetrice Martin was named to Coach Mora's Bruin staff in December of 2011. He left a position as the secondary/cornerbacks coach at the University of Washington to join the Bruins and soon had a large impact in the area of recruiting, as well as, on the field. He was promoted to Assistant Head Coach in February of 2014 and then to Assistant Head Coach-Defense/Defensive Backs in February of 2015. In 2015, the Bruins secondary led the Pac-12 in pass defense, allowing the fewest average yards per game and the lowest average yards per pass attempt (5.6) of any school. UCLA also led the Conference in pass defense efficiency (111.5), ranking 18th nationally in the category, and producing three players who received all-conference recognition - Randall Goforth, Jaleel Wadood and Marcus Rios.

In 2014, four of his defensive backs were honored with All-Pac-12 accolades (Ishmael Adams-1st team; Fabian Moreau and Anthony Jefferson-2nd team; Wadood honorable mention). The defense ranked third in the conference and the secondary unit ranked fourth in the Pac-12 in pass defense. Jefferson, who led the secondary with 72 tackles and was invited to the Senior Bowl, joined Moreau in a tie for the team lead with eight passes defended. Jefferson signed with the Chicago Bears.

Martin helped to prepare a secondary which featured three new starters, in 2013. Adams, who came on to lead the team in interceptions, and Moreau were first-time starters at the corners. Jefferson ranked third on the team in tackles (89) in his initial season as a starter. Randall Goforth, the veteran of the group in his sophomore season, was fourth on the squad in tackles (78) and second with three interceptions.

Martin mentored a veteran group in his first season with the Bruins. Senior cornerback Sheldon Price, who has moved on to the Indianapolis Colts, matched a school record with three interceptions in the Houston win. Andrew Abbott, along with Price, ranked among the Pac-12 leaders with four interceptions in 2012. Tevin McDonald was listed with the conference leaders in passes defended.

Martin had been on the University of Washington staff for three seasons prior to coming to UCLA. The 2010 Husky secondary finished second in the Pac-10 in pass defense.

In 2006 and 2007, he was a defensive graduate assistant at USC, working with the Trojan secondary. Prior to joining the USC staff, Martin spent three seasons (2003-05) as the pass defense coordinator and secondary coach at Mt. San Antonio College (Mt. SAC) in Walnut, CA. The Mounties played in the National Bowl in 2003 and 2004. He was also the secondary coach at Pasadena City College in 2001 and 2002. The Lancers went 18-4 during that period, winning the Mission Conference title both seasons and appearing in two bowl games. He began his career in coaching at Monrovia (Calif.) High (1999-2000).

A product of Pasadena (Calif.) Muir High School, Martin went to Michigan State, where he played wide receiver and cornerback from 1992 to 1995, earning first-team All-Big Ten honors in 1994 when he led the conference with seven interceptions. He had 10 interceptions in his career and the Spartans went on to play in the Liberty (1993) and Independence (1995) bowl games.

Martin played professionally as a cornerback for the Scottish Claymores in NFL Europe (1997) and for the Houston Thunderbears (1998-99) in the Arena Football League. He signed as a free agent with the St. Louis Rams in the NFL and spent time on the practice squad.

From 1994-98, he was on Tuberville's staff at Mississippi as the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach. Ole Miss won the 1997 Motor City Bowl and produced the school's first 1,000-yard rusher since 1950, Deuce McAllister, who would later star in the NFL for the New Orleans Saints. Mazzone also coached quarterback Stu Patridge, who set an NCAA record in passing efficiency and a school record with 200 straight pass attempts without an interception.

Mazzone was the quarterbacks coach at the University of Minnesota from 1992-94 and at TCU from 1987-91. At Texas Christian, he coached quarterback Matt Vogler who set a then NCAA single-game passing record with 690 yards, completing 44 passes, in a 1990 game against Houston.

The first stop on Mazzone's coaching journey was a five-year stint at Colorado State working with the quarterbacks and receivers. He mentored quarterback Kelly Stouffer, who was the sixth overall selection in the 1986 NFL Draft by the Seattle Seahawks.

Mazzone began his coaching career, in 1980-81, as a graduate assistant at the University of New Mexico. He was an assistant coach at Boulder High School in Boulder, Colorado, in 1981. A native of Raton, N.M., Mazzone graduated from the University of New Mexico in 1980. He also played quarterback for the Lobos, leading the team in passing in 1976 and 1977.



TAYLOR MAZZONE

Quarterbacks

3rd Season

East Carolina '09

Taylor, the son of offensive coordinator Noel Mazzone (pronounced Muh-ZONE-ee), was promoted to quarterbacks coach in January of 2013. In the 2012 season, he was a graduate assistant coach for special teams at UCLA. He had been on the staff at Arizona State University prior to coming to Westwood.

Freshman Josh Rosen, the Pac-12 Offensive Freshman of the Year and a Freshman All-America selection, eclipsed most of the Bruin school records for true freshmen during a banner season which saw him rank among the top 25 in the nation in completions per game (22nd), passing yards (19th) and passing yards per game, (21st). In addition, he rose to third on the school single-season passing and single-season completions lists. Rosen also established a new overall school mark with 245 pass attempts without an interception.

Brett Hundley continued to put up big numbers in 2014 under Mazzone's guidance. He established school career records for total offense (11,713) and touchdown passes (75) while ranking fourth in the NCAA in completion percentage (.691) and 13th in passing efficiency (152.7). Hundley, who was selected by the Green Bay Packers in the 2015 NFL Draft, also became the first Bruin to throw for at least 3,000 yards in three different seasons. He finished his career with a school record 19 300-yard total offense games and posted his 10th 300-yard passing game against USC, a total which ranks second on that school list. Hundley left UCLA owning five of the school's 10 400-yard total offense performances. No other Bruin had recorded more than two such games. Hundley was listed among the nation's top-25 in completion % (4th-.691), passing efficiency (13th-152.7) and total offense (19th-292.2).

In 2013, Hundley threw for over 400 yards for the first time in his career (410 v. Cal, third-highest total in school history) and his sum of 428 yards of total offense against Cal ranked fourth on the all-time school list. Hundley also became the first Bruin to ever throw for a touchdown, run for a score and catch a touchdown pass in the same game. The Bruins also racked up a school record 692 yards of total offense in the game against New Mexico State. Hundley was listed among the nation's top-25 in completion % (14th-.668), passing efficiency (20th-152.9), touchdown passes (23rd-24), points responsible for (14th-216), points responsible for per game (18th-16.8) and total offense (23rd-293.8). Mazzone joined the ASU coaching staff in February of 2010, serving as a quality control coach. In 2011, he became an offensive assistant and the Sun Devil offense was ranked 25th in the nation (445.8 yds/g) and 10th in passing offense (316.7 yds/g). Quarterback Brock Osweiler (2nd round selection of the Denver Broncos in 2012 NFL Draft) ranked 11th in the NCAA in total offense (317.4). In 2010, ASU was listed as the No. 15 pass offense in the nation and the No. 29 total offense in the country. Mazzone has also worked with college quarterbacks training for the jump to the NFL such as Tim Tebow, Christian Ponder, Robert Griffin III and Osweiler.

Taylor attended both Ole Miss and East Carolina University where he was a member of the football teams. He spent one season at Mississippi (2005) and then transferred to East Carolina where he played quarterback and on special teams under head coach Skip Holtz. The Pirates went on to play in four bowl games and capture two Conference USA championships. His ECU teams racked up 33 wins as a class.

Mazzone graduated, with honors, from Cardinal Gibbons High School in Raleigh, NC in 2005. He was a member of the football, basketball, baseball and track teams.



ANGUS MCCLURE

Recruiting Coordinator/Defensive Line

9th Season (4th w/defensive line)

Sacramento State '93

Angus McClure has over 20 years of coaching experience and is entering his ninth season as a member of the Bruin staff. In 2012, he began coaching the defensive line, having previously coached tight ends, O-line and special teams since arriving in Westwood in 2007. Angus continues in his role as the Recruiting Coordinator. Over the past eight years, McClure has led the recruiting efforts which has resulted in Bruin classes being ranked among the nation's top 20 in each year. In 2013-14, he was named among the Top 25 Recruiters in College Football by Rivals.

First-team All-Pac-12 and third-team AP All-America performer Kenny Clark led a Bruin defense which surrendered the fewest yards per play average (4.9) of any team in the Pac-12 Conference. The Bruins rated fourth in total defense in the league and allowed the second-fewest rushing touchdowns of any Pac-12 program.

In 2014, McClure's defensive line keyed a unit which ranked third in the Pac-12 in total defense. Owanagbe Odighizuwa, a third-round selection of the New York Giants, and Clark each earned second-team All-Pac-12 honors. Eddie Vanderdoes was named honorable mention. Odighizuwa's selection in the 2015 NFL Draft marked the sixth time in the last eight drafts that a Bruin defensive lineman had been chosen. In addition, Ellis McCarthy signed with the Miami Dolphins.

In 2013, Cassius Marsh, who earned an East-West All-Star game and NFL combine invite, and Keenan Graham each enjoyed career seasons. Marsh was a fourth-round selection by the Seattle Seahawks. McClure also helped tutor a group of impressive young linemen. McCarthy was named one of the team's most improved players. Vanderdoes, a freshman All-America pick, and Clark, Most Valuable Lineman at the Sun Bowl, caused opponents problems all season long. UCLA became the only school to have five defensive linemen participate in College All-Star Games in the previous two years.

Several of McClure's defensive linemen enjoyed career seasons in 2012 and helped the Bruins rank among the nation's best in sacks while advancing to the Conference Championship game for a second straight season. Datone Jones finished with 19.0 tackles for loss and went on to be a first-round selection in the NFL Draft. Marsh registered 10.5 tackles for loss and 8.0 sacks. Odighizuwa totaled 44 tackles, 6.0 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks. In 2011 with McClure coaching the offensive line, UCLA led the South Division of the Pac-12 in rushing and played in the inaugural Pac-12 Championship Game. Over his time as a Bruin coach, McClure has tutored a number of NFL players: Marsh (Seahawks), Jones (Packers), Sealii Espenosa (Patriots), Kevin McDermott (49ers/Ravens/Vikings), Logan Paulsen (Redskins), Matthew Slater (Patriots), Mike Harris (Chargers/Vikings), Nate Chandler (Panthers), Jeff Baca (Vikings/Chargers), Jeff Locke (Vikings), Cory Harkey (Rams), Kai Forbath (Redskins/Saints) and Christian Yount (Browns).

McClure came to UCLA after serving as the offensive line/run game coordinator on Turner Gill's staff at the University of Buffalo in 2006. Buffalo scored more points in conference games than any other team in the Mid-American Conference East. Running back James Starks (starter for 2011 Packers' Super Bowl Championship team) earned second-team All-MAC honors and was an honorable mention Freshman All-American. Offensive lineman Jamie Richard was drafted and became a starter for the Indianapolis Colts.

McClure spent the 2004 and 2005 seasons as an assistant on Bill Callahan's staff at Nebraska. He worked with the offensive line, coaching tackles, as well as with special teams. The Cornhuskers defeated Michigan in the 2005 Alamo Bowl. McClure pupil Matt Slauson was named a Freshman All-American. As a Husker coach, McClure tutored a number of NFL-bound players: Matt Slauson (Jets), Lydon Murtha (Dolphins), Chris Patrick (Giants) and Sam Koch (Ravens).

Prior to his stint at Nebraska, McClure was an assistant head coach and offensive line coach at Sacramento State University (1997-2003) where he played a major role in record-breaking offenses. During his tenure, the Hornets set 52 NCAA Division I-AA, Big Sky Conference, or school records. He coached 20 All-Big Sky conference honorees and had six of his players sign NFL contracts. One of McClure's pupils, Lonie Paxton of the Patriots (also Broncos), went on to collect three Super Bowl rings. Another McClure pupil, Marco Cavka was drafted by the Jets. In addition, five Sacramento State players earned All-American honors and four were chosen to participate in college all-star games. In his seven seasons at Sac State, the Hornets led the Big Sky in rushing four times (1998, 1999, 2000, 2002).

In 1996, McClure coached tight ends at the University of Nevada. He helped the Wolf Pack to the Big West title, a 9-3 record, and the Las Vegas Bowl championship. His tight ends produced a school record 13 touchdowns during the season. Nevada led Division I-A with 527.3 yard per game of total offense and topped the Big West Conference in both rushing and passing.

Angus has served as a guest coach in several NFL camps over the years, including the Dallas Cowboys (2013), Buffalo Bills (2007, 2006), San Francisco 49ers (2002, 2000, 1999, 1998, 1997, 1996), Seattle Seahawks (1998) and San Diego Chargers (2011, 2010, 1997).

A graduate of Sacramento State, McClure played football there from 1987-91 and later served as a member of the faculty from 1997-2004. He was on the 1988 Hornet team that advanced to the NCAA Division II championship semifinals with an offense which averaged 486.0 yards per game. He began his coaching career at McClatchy High School in Sacramento as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator from 1992-95 while also coaching the offensive line and tight ends.



SCOTT WHITE

Linebackers/Special Teams

1st Season

Washington '06

Scott White was named Linebackers/Special Teams coach in February of 2015. He had served on the UCLA staff for the past four seasons, most recently in the capacity of defensive quality control.

The Bruins defense limited opponents to just 4.9 yards per play, on average, the lowest mark in the Pac-12 Conference during the 2015 season. Linebacker Jayon Brown topped the team in tackles and ranked among the top 10 in the conference in tackles averaged per game. Linebackers Deon Hollins and Aaron Wallace each earned All-Pac-12 recognition after constantly pressuring the opposing quarterback during the season. Wallace ranked tied for third in the league in sacks per game (0.58) and tied for seventh in tackles for loss (1.0) average per game.

On special teams, placekicker Ka'imi Fairbairn won the Lou Groza Award and earned numerous first-team All-America accolades after setting a new Pac-12 career scoring record and booting a 60-yard field goal. The Bruins ranked among the best in the league, in 2015, in kickoff returns (3rd) and kickoff coverage (4th). Devin Fuller ranked second in the conference in punt return average (11.8), a mark which placed him 18th in the nation.

White originally came to UCLA from Palomar College in San Marcos, Calif. where he coached the linebackers. Before his stint at Palomar, he was an assistant football coach at Central Washington University in Ellensburg, Wash.

White attended the University of Washington and was a multiple-season starter at outside linebacker. He played in 45 career games, from 2003-06, for coaches Keith Gilbertson and Tyrone Willingham. White totaled 278 tackles, 38 for loss, with 11 sacks for his career. He also picked off five passes, forced five fumbles and recovered five fumbles. His career total of 38.0 tackles for loss ranks among the top 15 all-time in UW history.

The San Diego native was named Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Week after recording 10 tackles, three for losses, and two sacks in Washington's 21-10 win over Arizona on Oct. 4, 2006, when the Huskies held the Wildcats to minus-seven yards rushing. He earned Sporting News Pac-10 All-Freshman honors in 2003.

White was named San Diego CIF Defensive Player of the Year and San Diego Union-Tribune Defensive Player of the Year in 2001 after compiling 167 total tackles, 11 sacks, four fumble recoveries, two blocked punts and an interception. He also rushed for nearly 1,000 yards and 20 touchdowns on the offensive side of the ball. White helped lead Mission Bay High School to back-to-back CIF-San Diego Section Division II championships in 2000 and 2001.



TOM BRADLEY

Defensive Coordinator

1st Season

Penn State '79

Tom Bradley, who came to Westwood with over 35 years of coaching experience, is widely regarded as one of the top defensive minds in college football.

"To bring a coach of Tom Bradley's caliber to UCLA is very exciting," said Mora at the time of his hiring. "His knowledge of the game, extensive experience, level of intensity and attention to detail all make him one of the best defensive teachers in college football. Combine that with the fact that he has strong national recruiting ties and is one of the most well respected coaches in the game - it all adds up to Tom being a tremendous addition to our staff."

In 2015, coach Bradley's Bruin defense surrendered just 4.9 yards per play, the lowest mark in the Pac-12 conference. The Bruins secondary led the conference in fewest yards passing allowed per game and in team pass defense efficiency. It also topped the league in fewest yards allowed per opponent pass attempt (5.6). In addition, UCLA allowed just 13 rushing touchdowns to tie for second in the Pac-12 in that category.

Bradley came to UCLA after spending the 2014 season as West Virginia's senior associate head coach. Prior to his time in Morgantown, Bradley spent more than 30 years on the sidelines at Penn State, serving as the Nittany Lion's defensive coordinator from 2000-2011 and as interim head coach in 2011.

Under Bradley, Penn State's defenses were regularly atop the national rankings. In his time as defensive coordinator, Bradley guided the Nittany Lions to six consecutive top 15 finishes in both total and scoring defense (2004-09). From 2004-2011, Penn State held 53 of its 88 opponents to 17 points or fewer, including a run of 10 games during the 2009 season. During that same eight season span, Bradley's defenses ranked in the top 10 nationally in points allowed seven times and in the top 20 nationally in total defense seven times. In particular, the 2008 unit was one of only four defenses nationally to rank in the top 10 in rushing, total and scoring defense and led the Big Ten in both rushing and total defense.

Over the course of his time at Penn State, Bradley helped the Nittany Lions to 13 double-figure win seasons, 20 seasons with at least nine wins, 27 bowl appearances and the 1982 and 1996 national championships.

Recognized as Rivals Defensive Coordinator of the Year in 2008, Bradley was also named the Associated Press Defensive Coordinator of the Year in 2005 and selected as one of the nation's top 10 recruiters by Sports Illustrated.com that same year.

In all, Bradley coached 18 All-Americans, 43 All-Conference players and helped 51 student-athletes reach the National Football League while at Penn State. The All-Americans included: LaVar Arrington (LB/1998-99); Navarro Bowman (LB/2009); James Boyd (S/2000); Courtney Brown (DE/1999); Shane Conlon (LB/1985-86); Dan Connor (LB/2006-07); Tamba Hali (DE/2005); Kim Herring (S/1996); David Macklin (CB/1998); O.J. McDuffie (WR/1992); Paul Posluszny (LB/2005-06); Brandon Short (LB/1999); Alan Zemaitis (DB/2005); Michael Zordich (S/1985).

Bradley was a member of the Penn State football team from 1975-78, earning letters his final two seasons (helping the Nittany Lions to a 22-2 record), highlighted by a berth in the 1978 National Championship game vs. Alabama. He helped the Nittany Lions earn spots in the 1975 and '79 Sugar Bowls, the 1976 Gator Bowl and the 1977 Fiesta Bowl.

A native of Johnstown, Pa., Bradley earned his degree in business in 1979 and a Master's in sports administration from Penn State in 1986. He was a graduate assistant in 1979 and became a full-time staff member in 1980, initially serving as special teams coach. Bradley is a graduate of Bishop McCort High School in Johnstown and is an inductee in the Cambria County Sports Hall of Fame for his accomplishments in football, basketball and track and field as a prep student-athlete. He was inducted into the Western Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in May of 2014.



ERIC YARBER

Receivers
4th Season
Idaho '95

Eric Yarber joined the Bruin staff as receivers coach in January of 2012, after two seasons with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and five seasons overall in the NFL.

Jordan Payton became UCLA's all-time receptions leader during the 2015 campaign and could become the first Bruin to record 200 catches during the bowl game. The senior also moved up to third on the all-time receiving yards list. Thomas Duarte earned second-team all-conference honors after registering 10 touchdown catches, fourth on the all-time school single-season list. Devin Fuller moved up to the top sixth in career receptions at the school.

In 2014, Coach Yarber saw two of his Bruin receivers produce top-10 UCLA single-season reception totals - Payton's 67 catches ranked sixth and Fuller's 59 catches ranked 10th. Payton's total of 954 receiving yards rated ninth on that all-time school list. In addition, Duarte was 15th in the NCAA and first in the Pac-12 in yards per reception (19.29 yards per catch).

In year two at UCLA, Yarber helped senior Shaq Evans, a fourth-round selection of the Jets in the 2014 NFL Draft, finish up his career ranked tied for 10th on the school's all-time reception list. Evans earned an invite to the Senior Bowl and the NFL combine after catching nine scoring passes in 2013, tied for ninth on the all-time school list. Fuller, Payton and Devin Lucien each nearly doubled their first-year production.

In his first season with the Bruins, Yarber's direction helped Evans and Jerry Johnson record breakout years in 2012. Evans' 60 catches led the team and were the eighth-most by a Bruin in a single-season. His total of 877 receiving yards ranked 11th-best on that single-season school list. Johnson caught a career-best 31 balls for 428 yards.

In 2011, Yarber worked as Tampa Bay's wide receivers coach for a promising young unit that included the development of second-round pick Arrelious Benn and fourth-round pick Mike Williams. Williams turned in one of the top seasons by a receiver in Buccaneers history, recording 65 receptions for 964 yards and 11 touchdowns. He led all rookie receivers in each category, earning The Sporting News and PFWA/PFWA All-Rookie Team honors while finishing second in voting for the Associated Press Offensive Rookie of the Year Award. Yarber also oversaw the emergence of Benn, who was becoming an important part of the Tampa Bay offense prior to a season-ending knee injury in Week 13.

Yarber came to Tampa Bay after spending three seasons (2007-09) on the collegiate level as the wide receivers coach at Arizona State. While at ASU in 2009, Yarber coached two standout wide receivers in Kyle Williams and Chris McGaha. Williams finished the 2009 campaign with 815 receiving yards on 57 catches and eight scores before being a sixth-round draft pick of the San Francisco 49ers in the 2010 NFL Draft. McGaha racked up 56 catches for 673 yards and four TDs on his way to second-team All-Pac 10 honors.

Prior to his work with the Sun Devils, Yarber coached wide receivers for two seasons (2005-06) under Tyrone Willingham at the University of Washington. With Yarber's assistance, two receivers, Sonny Shackleford and Anthony Russo, turned in stellar performances, with Russo finishing third in the Pacific-10 Conference with a 17.3 yards-per-catch average and Shackleford finishing fourth in touchdown catches (seven) and eighth in receptions (50) and receiving yards (666).

During the 2003-04 seasons, Yarber coached the San Francisco 49ers' wide receivers, and in his first year guided Pro Bowler Terrell Owens to a 1,000-yard season. During this time, Yarber was also instrumental in the development of wide receivers Cedrick Wilson and Brandon Lloyd, as the duo ranked first and second among 49ers' receivers in yards after the catch with a 13.6 and 13.1 average (min. 10 receptions) respectively in 2004.

From 1999-2002, Yarber coached at Oregon State, where he worked with running backs for one season (1999) before switching to wide receivers (2000-2002). His work with receivers Chad Johnson and T.J. Houshmandzadeh led to the two being selected in the second and seventh rounds, respectively, by the Cincinnati Bengals in the 2001 NFL Draft.

Yarber coached his first year in the NFL in 1998, working as an offensive quality control coach with the Seattle Seahawks, after spending the 1997 season coaching receivers at UNLV. His coaching career began in 1996 when he took a secondary coaching

position at his alma mater, Idaho.

Yarber was selected by the Washington Redskins as a 12th-round pick in the 1986 NFL Draft and spent three seasons as a wide receiver and punt returner. He was part of the Washington squad that defeated the Denver Broncos to win Super Bowl XXII in 1988, leading that team with 37 punt returns. At Idaho, Yarber was a Kodak All-American and the Big Sky Conference's Most Valuable Player during his senior year, catching 75 passes for 1,103 yards. As a junior, he finished 10th in the nation in punt returns and third in the conference with 817 receiving yards on 54 catches. He attended Crenshaw High School in Los Angeles.

Sal Alosi, who has both collegiate and NFL experience, was hired on Jan. 10, 2012 to be UCLA's strength and conditioning coordinator for football. He came to the Bruins after serving as the head strength and conditioning coach at Bryant University (Rhode Island) in 2011, where he worked with all 22 of the Bulldogs' varsity programs. Alosi's skill and knowledge in the weight room played a vital role in the development of the Bryant athletic department in its final year of transition to full Division I status.

Prior to working at Bryant, Alosi spent nine years in the NFL, where he served as the head strength and conditioning coach for both the New York Jets and the Atlanta Falcons.

A four-year letterwinner and linebacker at Hofstra University, Alosi led the Pride to back-to-back Division I-AA (now FCS) quarterfinal playoff appearances in 1999 and 2000 and topped the team in tackles as a senior.

Following his playing career, he joined the coaching staff at his alma mater, becoming an assistant strength and conditioning coach at Hofstra in 2001, when the Pride won its first Atlantic 10 Conference title in football, advancing to the Division I-AA playoffs for the third-straight year.

Alosi went on to join the NFL's New York Jets a season later and stayed there until the 2006 campaign, when he was hired by the Atlanta Falcons to direct the team's strength and conditioning program under head coach Jim Mora. After one season with the Falcons, though, Alosi returned to New York on Feb. 21, 2007 as the Jets' head strength and conditioning coach and was on the same staff as new Bruin offensive coordinator Noel Mazzone.

A native of Massapequa, N.Y., Alosi graduated from Hofstra University with a degree in exercise science.

PASADENA (AP) — Freshman Josh Rosen passed for Bruin true freshman records of 350 yards and three touchdowns in a stellar debut for UCLA, leading the No. 13 Bruins to a victory over Virginia.

Thomas Duarte, Devin Fuller and defensive tackle Kenny Clark caught scoring passes from the 18-year-old Rosen,

who went 28 for 35 with several stunning throws and no turnovers in his first game at the Rose Bowl.

Rosen, the first true freshman to ever start a Bruin opener, stepped in for three-year starter Brett Hundley with remarkable poise, and the Bruins racked up 503 total yards to beat Virginia.

Linebacker Myles Jack rushed for a touchdown, and the 310-pound Clark hauled in a TD pass late in the third quarter to cap the Bruins' strong offensive performance.

UCLA's first drive fizzled, but Rosen completed seven straight throws to close the first quarter, including a short TD pass to Fuller. Rosen then hit Duarte for a gorgeous 30-yard TD pass midway through the second quarter.

UCLA took control with an 85-yard drive in the third quarter capped by the first two runs from Jack, the linebacker in his third season of moonlighting as a short-yardage running back. Rosen, who completed his final nine passes, marched the Bruins 67 yards moments later, rolling out and hitting Clark in stride for the junior defensive lineman's first career score.

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Redshirt junior running back Paul Perkins ran for 151 yards and two touchdowns, true freshman quarterback Josh Rosen threw for another score and No. 13 UCLA rolled to a 37-3 victory over UNLV.

Rosen completed 22 of 42 passes for 223 yards as the Bruins piled up 526 yards in all, the second consecutive week UNLV's defense allowed more than 500. Perkins

scored on runs of seven and 56 yards in the third quarter as UCLA pulled away after taking a 17-0 lead at halftime. After the first two games of his college career, Rosen is 50 of 77 for 574 yards and four touchdowns. His performance against Virginia last week earned him the Walter Camp National Player of the Week award on offense.

Linebacker Kenny Young's interception return for a score was the 10th defensive touchdown scored since 2012. Ka'imi Fairbairn tied his career-best with a total of three made field goals in the game. The blocked punt by defensive end Takkarist McKinley was the 14th kick blocked by the Bruins under fourth-year coach Jim Mora. UCLA has won 13 of its last 14 non-conference games — and 10 straight since losing to Baylor in the 2012 Holiday Bowl. The Bruins have won all 11 regular-season non-conference games under Mora.

It was the first game in which UCLA did not surrender a touchdown since a 28-3 win against Washington State in 2008. The Bruins ran 98 plays from scrimmage in the contest and held UNLV to just 56 yards passing and 237 total yards.

PASADENA (AP) — Sophomore running back Nate Starks scored on a 3-yard run with 3:25 remaining, redshirt junior running back Paul Perkins rushed for 219 yards and a touchdown, and No. 10 UCLA rallied to beat No. 19 BYU in the Rose Bowl before over 67,000 fans. With freshman quarterback Josh Rosen struggling, the Bruins' ground game picked up the slack

to maintain coach Jim Mora's perfect regular-season record against non-conference opponents. After Rosen's 9-yard pass to Jordan Payton to open the drive, the next six plays were all runs by Perkins and Starks to set up the decisive score. Starks ripped off runs of 31 and 22 yards on consecutive carries before scoring two plays later.

Quarterback Tanner Mangum drove the Cougars to the Bruins 42-yard line, but his fourth-down pass was intercepted by Myles Jack, allowing the Rose Bowl crowd to finally celebrate.

Rosen was 11 of 23 for 106 yards with a 19-yard touchdown to Payton early in the fourth quarter, and three interceptions. The Cougars frequently pressured Rosen and he threw all three picks in the first half. Paul Langi picked off Rosen at the 5-yard line to end a promising drive, and Kai Nacua came up with an interception in the end zone in the final minute of the second quarter.

The mistakes prompted UCLA to rely on Perkins to save the day. The Pac-12's leading rusher last season set a career high, and had runs of 44 and 33 yards to set up touchdown drives before Starks delivered the final blow. The rally from the fourth quarter double-digit deficit was UCLA's first since 2005.

TUCSON (AP) — True freshman Josh Rosen was sharp in his first Pac-12 road game, throwing for 284 yards and accounting for three touchdowns.

UCLA turned three Arizona turnovers into touchdowns while building a 28-point first half lead. UA got off to a great start against UCLA's depleted defense, which had lost starters Eddie Vanderdoes at defensive line, Myles Jack at linebacker

and Fabian Moreau at defensive back, quick-hitting its way to a 34-yard touchdown pass from Solomon to Nate Phillips. UCLA evened the score cashing in on its first drive of the game on a 35-yard dart from Rosen to Thomas Duarte.

However, Arizona's second series ended quickly when a snap sailed over Solomon's hand and the Bruins recovered. Running back Paul Perkins scored on a 16-yard run the next play. The Wildcats lost another fumble and Rosen found Jordan Payton for a 5-yard touchdown pass that put UCLA up 28-7 early in the second quarter.

UCLA complemented its opportunistic defense with an efficient offense. Rosen was crisp against the Wildcats, picking them apart for 212 yards and two touchdowns on 13-of-17 passing by half.

UA gained a little momentum to open the second half after back-up quarterback Jerard Randall scrambled and found David Richards for a 16-yard touchdown. The Wildcats reached UCLA's 3 on the next drive, but settled for a field goal, cutting the deficit to 42-23. The Bruins managed to take control of the game right back, though, moving quickly to set up Rosen's 8-yard touchdown run. Freshman SoSo Jamabo finished off the Bruins' scoring with a 10-yard run.

PASADENA (AP)—Mike Bercovici passed for 273 yards and two touchdowns and ran for another, and Arizona State came away with a victory. ASU built a 29-10 lead heading into the fourth quarter before the Bruins rallied. Thomas Duarte caught his second touchdown pass from Josh Rosen with 9:19 left, trimming the Sun Devils' lead to 29-23. But Matt Haack's exceptional punt and a defensive stand forced the Bruins to take a safety with 4:16 left. Arizona State wrapped up

the decision with a late TD run.

The Sun Devils shut down UCLA's running game and tormented Rosen, who completed 22-for-40 for 280 yards with an interception. UCLA tailback Paul Perkins was held to 63 yards rushing and a fourth-quarter touchdown.

Arizona State took the lead in the first quarter when Rosen was called for intentional grounding in the end zone. Tim White followed up the Sun Devils' safety by returning the kickoff 65 yards and then rumbling in with a 14-yard TD catch. Bercovici ran up the middle for a 34-yard score early in the third quarter, and Foster caught a TD pass shortly afterward to extend the ASU advantage. UCLA's offense got rolling in the fourth quarter, with Perkins making a gutsy 29-yard run before a 1-yard TD plunge. Linebacker Isaako Savaiinaea made an interception near midfield moments later, and then UCLA capped off a scoring drive when Duarte caught a 17-yard TD pass.

Arizona State's next drive stalled, but Haack rolled his punt out of bounds right in front of the goal-line pylon, and UCLA snapped its own punt attempt high out of the end zone on purpose but could not stop ASU's next drive.

STANFORD, Calif. (AP) — As well as Stanford played offensively, it might have taken a perfect game to beat the Cardinal who swept past visiting UCLA on Thursday night for their eighth straight win in the series.

An early interception of a Rosen pass was returned for a touchdown, a long kickoff return allowed that set up another score and 10 penalties for 93 yards were far too much for the Bruins to overcome.

Francis Owusu pinned the ball on the back of a Bruin defender in the end zone for a touchdown catch and running back Christian McCaffrey did most of the rest, with a school-record 243 yards rushing and four touchdowns.

"It was a tough loss against a good team," coach Jim Mora said. "The pick 6, the kickoff return, the nine offensive penalties, those are tough things to overcome. We hurt ourselves with missed tackles."

McCaffrey, who finished with 369 all-purpose yards, scored on a 70-yard run out of the wildcat, returned a kick 96 yards to set up another score and ran for three more touchdowns in a performance that set a new school rushing record.

Bruin true freshman quarterback Josh Rosen threw for 325 yards and three touchdowns. It was his second 300-yard effort of the season. Paul Perkins ran for 104 and a score, but the Bruins dropped their second straight Pac-12 contest.

"Every loss hurts. We have to execute a lot better than we did tonight," safety Randall Goforth said. "Their quarterback did everything right and they outplayed us. I just have to make sure everybody is staying together and we'll come back and be ready to fight."

PASADENA (AP) - After two straight conference losses, quarterback Josh Rosen produced a passing performance that put the true freshman's name in the Bruins' record book and lifted UCLA past California on a Thursday night. Rosen completed a school-record 34 passes (for 399 yards) and threw two of his three touchdown passes to Devin Fuller.

Junior Thomas Duarte had career highs of 10 catches for 141 yards for

the Bruins. UCLA rebounded from consecutive losses to Arizona State and Stanford, with a 573-yard offensive performance and a stellar effort by its defense, which sacked Cal's Jared Goff five times.

"Every time you win, it's a step forward," said Rosen, who broke the school completions record set by Richard Brehaut and Brett Hundley. "Especially with our bye week, that was three weeks without a win, so it felt great to come out here and put it to them."

Soso Jamabo rushed for a score after star UCLA tailback Paul Perkins left with an injury, and the Bruins' injury-plagued defense limited Goff and Cal's potent offense to 170 yards in the first half. Debuting their black-and-gold "City" uniforms, UCLA appeared revitalized. Ka'imi Fairbairn made four field goals, including a school-record 60-yarder at the halftime gun, and the UCLA defense caused trouble for Goff throughout. Senior linebacker Aaron Wallace recorded a career-best 2.5 sacks to lead the Bruins defense.

"The key was getting that quarterback on the ground," UCLA coach Jim Mora said. "We struggle with that, and we got it done against a really good player."

"Things that we haven't done all year, we did tonight," Cal coach Sonny Dykes said. "That's not indicative of this football team..."

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) -- Colorado ran 114 plays and held the ball for more than 41 minutes while the latest wave of injuries washed over UCLA's already battered defense. The weary Bruins weathered everything the Buffaloes could manage.

Soso Jamabo rushed for the go-ahead touchdown with 8:28 to play and the Bruins escaped. Josh Rosen passed for 262 yards and a touchdown for the Bruins, who won despite giving up 18 consecutive points in the second half

and yielding 554 total yards. Rosen's 407 yards of total offense was the ninth-best total in UCLA history and the 11th of at least 400 yards. The Buffaloes dominated possession to an extraordinary degree, forcing UCLA's defense to stay on the field for 55 more snaps than its counterpart, including a 40-4 CU edge in the second quarter.

"That was the longest game I've ever played on defense, ever," said junior linebacker Jayon Brown, who led the Bruins with 18 tackles, the most since Randall Goforth registered 19 in a 2013 game at Stanford. "This was a first, just between the injuries we had, the new injuries we got and all their first downs. Hope we don't ever have another one like this, but if we do, we'll be ready."

Patrick Carr rushed for 110 yards, and his TD run put Colorado into the lead, 31-28, with 12:04 to play. The Bruins answered with Jamabo's score before stopping the Buffaloes twice in UCLA territory on an 88-degree Halloween day in the Arroyo Seco. Junior defensive end Takkarist McKinley's pressure forced a poor throw by Sefo Liufau on fourth down with 3:34 to play. Freshman backup defensive back Nate Meadors intercepted a pass by Liufau near midfield with 51 seconds left.

"That was about as gritty a win as I've ever been around," UCLA coach Jim Mora said. "To overcome the things that we overcame in terms of personnel, that was staggering. I couldn't tell you who was in there on any given play. From cramps to sprained ankles to hamstrings, and then a true freshman seals it - a safety playing corner. That's a team win."

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—True freshman quarterback Josh Rosen helped UCLA keep alive its Pac-12 title hopes, throwing two touchdown passes to Thomas Duarte in cold, rainy conditions.

Rosen was 22-for-33 for 333 yards before sitting out the fourth quarter. The Bruins had 676 yards, the third-highest total in school history. UCLA

limited Oregon State to 246 yards

and forced four turnovers against redshirt freshman quarterback Nick Mitchell. It was the Bruins' first shutout since a 2007 contest against Oregon and their first on the road since a 1987 game versus Stanford.

Rosen has 131 attempts without an interception since the third quarter of the Stanford game. It was the second time this season the Bruins have held an opponent out of the end zone.

The Bruins capitalized on turnovers to score 24 points in the second quarter. Oregon State had a drive going late in the first quarter, but Mitchell fumbled at the UCLA 34 and the Bruins recovered. UCLA's drive stalled and Ka'imi Fairbairn had a 38-yard field goal to open the scoring.

On Oregon State's next possession, Randall Goforth picked off Mitchell's pass at the Beavers 42. Rosen threw an 8-yard touchdown pass to Duarte, capping a seven-play drive. Later in the half, Rosen showed off his arm on a 63-yard pass to Kenneth Walker. A few plays later, the Bruins capped a 96-yard drive with another touchdown pass to Duarte. Mitchell threw his second interception on Oregon State's subsequent drive, leading to Paul Perkins' touchdown run that made it 24-0.

UCLA got the ball to open the second half and scored on Nate Starks' 11-yard run. Fairbairn made another field goal, and Soso Jamabo added a 30-yard touchdown run at the end of the third quarter to cap off the scoring.

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) -- Gabe Marks caught a 21-yard touchdown pass from Luke Falk with 3 seconds to play, sending Washington State to victory. WSU had an improbable addendum to what seemed to be a storybook ending. True freshman quarterback Josh Rosen capped a desperate 80-yard drive by scrambling 37 yards and diving for the go-ahead touchdown with 1:09 to play. Falk answered with his own 75-yard drive ending with a catch by Marks, who became the Cougars' career receptions leader earlier in the game.

Rosen went 33 for 57 for 340 yards, and the freshman appeared to clinch the win after Jaleel Wadood's end-zone interception with 3:13 left gave a last chance to the Bruins, who racked up 554 yards. "I don't think I've ever scored that many points on offense with only two touchdowns," Rosen said. "We've got to convert... we just didn't hold up our end of the bargain on offense." UCLA lost after leading at halftime for the first time in 32 games under coach Jim Mora. The Bruins also lost despite holding WSU's prolific Air Raid offense to 288 yards in the first three quarters. Sophomore running back Nate Starks had an early TD run for the Bruins, who still control their fate in the Pac-12 South. UCLA would win the division with season-ending road victories at Utah and Southern California.

"It's something we have to get over quickly," Mora said. "As crazy as it is, we're still right in the hunt for what our goal was all along." The Bruins allowed WSU to stay close by hurting themselves: a short punt, a fumbled punt return and a defensive holding call which wiped out a sack on third down, each provide WSU with scoring chances.

UCLA kicker Ka'imi Fairbairn became the leading scorer in Pac-12 history with his 392nd career point when the Bruins' opening drive ended with a 22-yard field goal. UCLA center Jake Brendel set a school record on the same drive with his 49th career start, surpassing linebacker Spencer Havner's 10-year-old mark.

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) -- UCLA is now officially one victory from playing in its first Pac-12 championship game since 2012 after beating No. 18 Utah. True freshman quarterback Josh Rosen threw for 220 yards and a touchdown as UCLA ended the Utes' Pac-12 title hopes.

"That is what we expect," Mora said.

"That is the kind of kids we have.

They're from diverse backgrounds. A lot of these young men could have given up in life a long time ago. But, that's not their character."

The Bruins scored touchdowns on two long drives to start the first and third quarters. Rosen, UCLA's freshman star, completed 15 of 30 passes and had a 122.6 quarterback rating. He's now thrown a school-record 218 consecutive passes without an interception. Paul Perkins added 98 rushing yards and a touchdown while Jordan Payton had a game-high 105 receiving yards for the Bruins and his fourth quarter catch gave him the UCLA career record for receptions with 194.

Utah's Travis Wilson threw for 110 yards and rushed for 67 while Joe Williams, who took over for an injured Devontae Booker, ran for 121 yards.

UCLA scored its lone touchdown of the first half on the opening possession of the game. Rosen hit receiver Thomas Duarte for 33 yards on the first play and 28 yards for a touchdown five snaps later.

Ka'imi Fairbairn put the Bruins up 10-0 with a 33-yard field goal with 4:01 left in the quarter, a score set up by Randall Goforth's recovery of Williams' fumble that ended the Utes' first possession. The Utes put together clock-eating drives in the second quarter, holding the ball for nine more minutes than UCLA. But Utah's four first-half drives produced just two 39-yard field goals. The Utes added a 21-yard field goal in the third quarter to cut the Bruins' lead to 10-9. But UCLA's Perkins scored on a two-yard run with 5:17 left in the third quarter to put Utah in a hole that it never recovered from.

LOS ANGELES (AP) -- USC scored 20 straight second-half points while clinching the Pac-12 South title with a win over UCLA in the 85th edition of their crosstown showdown.

While the Trojans' offense held the ball for 40 minutes, USC got its game-changing plays on defense and special teams. Adoree Jackson returned a punt 42 yards for a touchdown shortly before halftime, and Rasheem Green

put the Trojans ahead to stay in the third quarter when the freshman defensive lineman returned Josh Rosen's fumble for a 31-yard touchdown.

Paul Perkins rushed for two touchdowns for the Bruins, who lost to USC for the first time in coach Jim Mora's tenure. "It's a new feeling for us here," Mora said. "The game turned, obviously, on the punt return there right before the half and the turnovers in the second half. We couldn't get any, and they did, and they capitalized."

Rosen passed for 227 yards and hit Thomas Duarte for an early TD, but the freshman also threw two second-half interceptions. "I just felt like we made that defense look a lot better than they necessarily were," Rosen said. "No shots at them at all, we just didn't execute like we should have."

Kessler sneaked into the end zone to cap an 85-yard USC drive early in the second. Rosen looked sharp until USC's defense finally got pressure on him on consecutive plays deep in UCLA's end late in the first half. Jackson took the ensuing short punt all the way back to put the Trojans ahead 20-14.

Perkins' second TD run capped a 78-yard drive shortly after halftime, and UCLA appeared to be taking control until USC's Claude Pelon jarred the ball loose from Rosen, allowing freshman Green to take it to the house untouched. Moments later, Iman Marshall picked off a short throw for Rosen's first interception in 245 passes since the Stanford game, the longest interception-free streak in the FBS.

The education of UCLA QB Josh Rosen

LOS ANGELES -- We are conditioned to believe that incoming freshmen no longer have to prove they can play. They have to prove they can't. They arrive bigger, stronger and faster than ever before. They play games in the fall and 7-on-7 tournaments the rest of the year. Recruiting coverage raises a kid's national profile, and our expectations of him rise as well.

A year ago, [Myles Garrett](#) stepped onto the Texas A&M campus and set an SEC freshman record for sacks. Oregon tailback [Royce Freeman](#) set a school rushing record for a freshman (1,365 yards) and led the Pac-12 with 18 rushing touchdowns.

So when UCLA freshman quarterback [Josh Rosen](#) played well beyond his years in his first collegiate game, throwing for 351 yards and three touchdowns against Virginia on Sept. 5, he seemed like the latest iteration of the microwaveable star: slap him into a uniform, shove him onto the field and he heats up immediately.

"He just had a poise and a confidence about him and a maturity level that was higher than any 18-year-old that I had seen," Bruins tailback [Paul Perkins](#) said.

And two games later, that Josh Rosen has not been seen since.

The 18-year-old who wore the blue jersey with the gold 3 on it against BYU threw downfield when he should have thrown away, threw into windows that only he saw, threw with the timing of a middle-school orchestra.

"I probably played one of the worst games of my career," Rosen said.

Rosen completed 11 of 23 passes for 106 yards and one touchdown against the Cougars. He threw three interceptions, two of them in the red zone.

"That was the first defense that showed him, multiple, multiple looks," UCLA offensive coordinator Noel Mazzone said. "I didn't even know what it was half the time."

Quarterbacks set foot on campus bigger, stronger and faster, too. But they also have to be smarter in a way that other players don't. Before they use that rocket arm, they have to recognize the defense and make split-second decisions, and if they don't do it in three seconds, they are likely to be wearing a Myles Garrett.

August, and who started at Virginia, played with those smarts. His favorite target, senior wide receiver Jordan Payton, recalled Rosen's second touchdown pass at Virginia, a 30-yard clothesline to tight end Thomas Duarte.

"I ran five yards and turned around," Payton said, "and I'm looking at him, and right when he let the ball go, I turned around and watched the ball. ... He threw it on a laser to the corner [of the end zone]. I was like, boy, this boy is something else."

It wasn't just the speed of the throw. Duarte was not Rosen's primary receiver.

"The tight end is the second read," Payton said. "So he saw the second, and threw it down and away from the defender."

Only a confident quarterback makes that throw. Rosen does not lack for confidence. Three days into August camp, he told Payton he had mastered the UCLA offense. Payton raised an eyebrow. And then, a few days later, Rosen and backup quarterback Jerry Neuheisel led an offensive team meeting.

"He went through every single position and what he wanted each position to do during the plays," Payton said. "He coached me on a route. He said, 'I want it run like this.' And I looked at my coach [wide receivers coach Bobby Acosta] and said, 'Who is this kid? He's telling me how to run a route!'"

Was he right?

"Yeah! He was!"

The Rosen who played Saturday may have known his offense, but he sure didn't understand the Cougars' defense. At halftime, he had thrown four passes in the red zone: two incompletions, and those two picks. UCLA trailed 10-3.

"I'd love to tell you I move on to the next play and don't think about what's in the past," Rosen said. "No one's perfect. It's always in the back of my head a little, and you get frustrated and you just got to keep rolling. ... In the locker room, Coach Mora came up to me and said, 'Don't even think about it. Don't even think that I'm going to pull you. You're riding this one out.'"

UCLA head coach Jim Mora met Rosen almost four years ago, shortly after Mora arrived at UCLA. His daughter Lillia had met this guy in their Manhattan Beach neighborhood.

"My daughter said, 'Do you know some quarterback named Josh? He's supposed to be pretty good,'" Mora said. "I was brand-new.

"I said, 'I don't know. I can look around.'"

The families became friends. Mora has an insight into Rosen that most head coaches can't have about their freshmen.

"It was an ugly game for him," Mora said late Saturday night, "and he is going to look back. And that'll be a turning point for him. ... He thinks that he can get away with some things that you cannot get away with at this level. While I don't like that, I also think it's an amazing sign of his confidence."

Before halftime ended, Mora reminded Rosen, in front of the team, that the other 119 players in that locker room stood with him.

"Everyone was hootin' and hollerin'," Rosen said, "and it really, really made me feel pretty good that all these guys got my back. I'm ready to roll through anything."

Rosen is in the ideal lineup for a freshman quarterback. He has a veteran offensive line that can give him time. Perkins can carry the offense as he did against the Cougars, rushing for 219 yards and a touchdown.

There are a couple of other things to point out about Rosen's performance. In the fourth quarter, he went 3-for-3 for 33 yards. He led touchdown drives of 68 and 80 yards. And UCLA climbed from 10 points behind to defeat BYU 24-23. The Bruins, who travel to No. 16 Arizona on Saturday (ABC, 8 p.m. ET), are 3-0 and ranked ninth.

"He did a great job of managing the game," Mazzone said, "making good decisions for us on all our run-pass conflict stuff, and not thinking, 'OK, every throw I make has got to win us this football game.' That's just something that we all learn. ... The second half, I was really proud of him. The first half, I wanted to strangle him a couple of times."

The education of Josh Rosen continues. He may not be a microwaveable star. Then again, how many four-star entrées come out of the microwave?

UCLA's Soso Jamabo runs with fellow freshman Josh Rosen sooner than expected

UCLA was on the verge of finishing off California in the third quarter of last Thursday's football game and Soso Jamabo, a freshman running back, was in the thick of the Bruins' burial touchdown drive.

Yet he couldn't help but think ahead.

Josh Rosen, the Bruins' wunderkind freshman quarterback, was running things and Jamabo was at his side in the backfield.

"I was thinking that Josh and I were going to have some fun the next three years," Jamabo said.

Rosen was handed the keys to the offense when the season began. Jamabo, a Texas-sized football star from Plano, Texas, was still on a learner's permit. That plan may now be accelerated.

UCLA's Paul Perkins, who led the Pac-12 Conference in rushing last season, left the California game with a knee injury. Nate Starks, his backup, was already out with what UCLA has reported as a head injury.

So when the No. 24 Bruins play Colorado at the Rose Bowl on Saturday afternoon, the running game could consist of first-year freshmen Jamabo and Bolu Olorunfunmi, with Jamabo likely to take the lead role.

"We threw them into the fire this year," running backs coach Kennedy Polamalu said. "Coach [Jim] Mora and I discussed whether to redshirt these guys. We decided, 'No, throw them in there and let them grow as they go.'"

Jamabo is second on the team with 278 yards rushing after gaining 79 yards against Cal.

"It's a little different coming from high school," said Jamabo, who played at Plano West High. "A lot of guys [in the college game] were big coming out of high school."

Jamabo rivaled Rosen in recruiting circles. Both were ranked No.1 nationally at their positions by Scout.com. Jamabo gained 5,044 yards rushing and scored 68 touchdowns in his high school career.

"Texas football is different, as everybody knows," Mora said. "If you've ever watched 'Friday Night Lights,' that's pretty accurate. It's different. It's serious."

That culture identified Jamabo early on.

He made a quick impression on Roger Campbell, president of the Plano West booster club. "I first saw him when he was in elementary school, and even then he was a man playing with boys," Campbell said.

Someone like that doesn't remain a secret in Texas football. In his first game as a sophomore, Jamabo went 72 yards the second time he touched the ball.

By his senior year, Jamabo was a celebrity. He gained 490 yards and scored six touchdowns in one game.

"Kids would ask me for my socks after a game," Jamabo said. "I was like, 'Man, these kids really like me.' It was fun."

It bordered on too much fun at times.

During his senior year, with recruiting speculation out of control, Jamabo dramatically announced he had narrowed his choices to ITT Tech and the University of Phoenix. There were also a few post-touchdown penalties for excessive celebration.

"He played like a man, but he had a lot of little boy in him," Campbell said.

Said Jamabo: "Once you start getting all the attention, all the All-American stuff, it's a cool deal. But you just have to stay humble."

That became easier after a prom night incident, when Jamabo led police on a seven-minute car chase. He was never charged, but he said a lesson was learned.

"It was immaturity," Jamabo said. And a wake-up call.

"I realized that I have to make better decisions," Jamabo said.

He has a tutor for that.

"Having a leader like Paul [Perkins], a young man who is a self-starter, helps," Polamalu said.

"When the coaches are not around, the younger players see the work Paul puts in. You hope it rubs off."

It does.

"I realized how much I could learn from Paul Perkins," Jamabo said. "He gets up early. He gets in the training room early. After practice, he teaches us his routines."

Perkins said Jamabo has "come a long way in understanding both defensive schemes and what it takes to be a running back at this level."

The physical ability was already there.

"He is so explosive, you never know when his going to spin out of a tackle and break loose," Perkins said.

Jamabo eased into the season, with his opportunities usually coming with the Bruins in control of games. Against California, Jamabo gained 67 of his 79 yards after Perkins was injured.

The future looked good, for Rosen and Jamabo.

"It's going to be cool," offensive coordinator Noel Mazzone said, "watching those guys grow."

UCLA's Eli Ankou part of Canadian football's grassroots movement

As a child, Eli Ankou tried to figure out Ronaldinho's [signature move](#), tapping the soccer ball back and forth to shake out imaginary defenders. He trained in karate too, advancing to either a blue or red belt — it's hard to remember after all these years. And there was the stint he did with the Royal Canadian Air Cadets, which included a three-day survival test in the woods outside Ottawa. He built a lean-to out of roots, ate a lot of blueberries, and fended off hypothermia.

As for football?

"I didn't even know what a fumble was until the eighth grade," he says.

Looking at him now, that's difficult to believe. Today, Ankou is a UCLA defensive tackle, an imposing 6-foot-3, 305-pound redshirt junior. Defensive coordinator Tom Bradley has a habit of calling him "The Canadian Strongboy," as if introducing him at a carnival.

After Eddie Vanderdoes tore his ACL in the Bruins' season opener against Virginia, the Bruins turned to Ankou to fill in. Through six starts, he is tied for third on the team with 3.5 tackles for loss.

"He's a physical specimen," Victor Tedondo says. "Eli, he's pretty gifted. He's probably one of the strongest kids to ever come out of our camp. He's a warrior."

Tedondo, 29, is the founder of the Gridiron Academy in suburban Ottawa. He had gone through the recruiting process himself more than 12 years ago, drawing interest from Syracuse as a running back. However, his parents didn't see the need for him to leave the country just for football. He eventually enrolled at the University of Ottawa.

Now, Tedondo says, he's trying to provide aspiring young football players with the opportunities that he didn't have. After he began coaching youth football, he took notice of a big kid running around the field. Ankou had already hit 6-1, 230 [pounds](#) before [entering](#) high school, and played with a club team before joining the junior varsity team at St. Peter High School.

He credits Tedondo's tutelage for helping him reach his full potential.

"It was just from him giving me a confidence boost," Ankou says. "The idea that I could do it."

Along with his teammates — including current Virginia defensive end Trent Corney and [Maine](#) kicker Sean Decloux — he worked out two hours a day, five times a week to prepare for camps. They piled into cars and drove, hitting most of the East Coast. In the summer of 2011, Ankou flew out to Los Angeles and camped at UCLA and USC. The Bruins gave him his first offer.

"It's a question of loyalty," he said [four years ago](#). "If they believe in me, I can do the same for them."

Tedondo admits that building a legitimate football pipeline up to the north will still take more time, perhaps eight years to make more noise in the NFL draft, and even longer for something more [established](#). He likens it to the growth of Canadian basketball. Nearly a decade after Steve Nash went 15th overall in the 1996 NBA draft, Anthony Bennett and Andrew Wiggins topped the order in 2013 and 2014.

"I think it'll take people like Eli — people making it and playing for a couple of years — for it to really, really, really hit home," Tedondo says. "I think 2025, 2030, we'll be there."

Ankou isn't alone. In 2014, four Canadians [were drafted](#), a new record. At the other end of the path are players like [Patrice Rene](#), a four-star 2016 safety who committed to Rutgers after leaving Ottawa to play at Alexandria Episcopal in Virginia. Next February, UCLA is slated to sign Montreal native [J.J. Molson](#), one of the top kickers in the [class](#) of 2016.

Tedondo encourages his players to transfer to American high schools for more exposure and better competition, but other prospects are starting to find success even while staying at home. Neville Gallimore, another Ottawa native, played at Canada Prep Football Academy in St. Catharines, near Niagara Falls. He signed with Oklahoma this past spring as the [No. 83 recruit](#) in the class of 2015, and was the first Canadian to earn an invite to the U.S. Army All-American Bowl, broadcasted live on NBC.

"That sort of media attention always helps out," Ankou says. "There are guys out there waiting to be discovered. At this point, right now, they have to go get themselves discovered. We have to get to a point where we can recognize those guys."

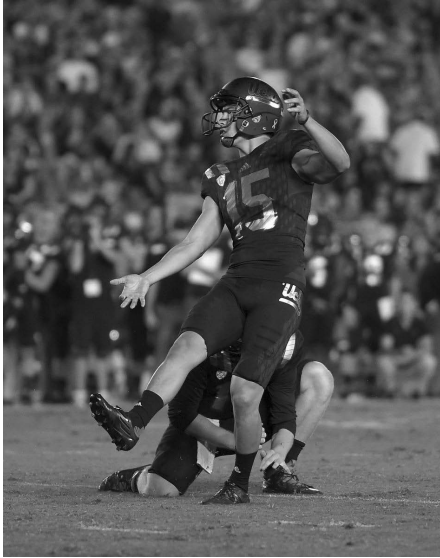

UCLA kicker Ka'imi Fairbairn shows off his leg

LOS ANGELES – Before Ka'imi Fairbairn kicked the longest field goal in UCLA history, he gave his coach a thumbs up. He hardly flinched. He stared straight on, at the goalpost in the north end zone of the Rose Bowl, without so much as a glance to the sideline. He extended his arm outward and raised his thumb. He was good. He steadied himself.

"I was zoned out, honestly," the senior kicker said.

Fairbairn drilled the 60-yard kick with yards to spare, but he almost didn't get to attempt it.

In the final seconds of the second quarter in UCLA's 40-24 win over Cal last Thursday, Fairbairn made a 55-yarder, but it was called off because the Bruins were whistled for a false start.

That gave Coach Jim Mora the choice. Forgo the kick and send out quarterback Josh Rosen to heave a Hail Mary, or leave Fairbairn, who had never made a field goal from at least 50 yards until two games earlier, in for another try?

His first instinct was the former. So Mora sent the offense onto the field, but he was stopped by Jerry Neuheisel, who went as far as trying to push some of them back to the sideline.

"I was yelling, 'No, we're kicking it. Get them off the field. We're kicking it,'" said Neuheisel, the backup quarterback who has been Fairbairn's holder for the past two seasons.

Mora gave it another thought.

"Imi, you got it?" he asked the kicker.

Fairbairn gave him the signal back. A few seconds later, the kick was good, and he was mobbed by teammates as they headed into the locker room, so much so that Neuheisel tried to usher him in there as quickly as possible.

"I was worried they were going to dogpile and hurt him," he said.

Later this season, Fairbairn, barring injury, will become the most successful UCLA kicker in a long lineage of decorated ones. He sits 18 points away from overtaking John Lee atop the school's career scoring list.

His newly discovered range has also thrust him into conversation for some of the top specialist honors.

Fairbairn is expected to be among 20 semifinalists announced next week for the Lou Groza Award as the nation's top kicker. He ranks fourth in the FBS in field-goal percentage, making 13 of 14 tries, and fifth in touchback percentage at 74 percent.

"I don't know if there's a more proficient kicker in the country than Ka'imi," Mora said. "It's been a long road for him. He's stuck with it. His teammates have believed in him the whole way. He's worked through things. He's kept his confidence and it's paying off for him."

Until the past month, distance had remained a lingering hurdle for Fairbairn.

Entering this season, he was 11 for 22 on field-goal attempts of 40 yards or longer.

Several of those misses had come at high-leverage moments.

In last season's 30-28 loss to Utah, he missed a 50-yard attempt on the game's final play. That try was his second crack to win the game, too, coming after the Utes were penalized 5 yards on his previous attempt.

"It really made me look in the mirror," the reserved Hawaii native said.

There were other high-profile struggles, too. In a 27-24 loss at Stanford in the 2012 Pac-12 championship game, he missed a 52-yard try with 30 seconds left.

"I know those kicks still haunt him," Neuheisel said. "Kicker's a lot like quarterbacks. You get a lot more credit than you deserve, and you get a lot more blame than you truly deserve. Those kicks kind of set him on a path to realize how much he really wanted this."

Fairbairn had always been rock steady from close range.

Since 2012, he is 46 for 52 on field-goal tries from within 40 yards, including 43 in a row within 35.

"What I tried to focus on was being money inside 40," he said. "When the offense gets the ball inside the red zone, you want to be 100 percent in there. The deep ones will come."

They have come, he points out, because of confidence, a mental adjustment over time.

"Every kicker's basically got the ability to kick anywhere on the field, and make any field goal," said Fairbairn, who says he has made tries from as far as 67 yards in practice. "What it comes down to is having the mental awareness to focus on just what you can control. And not worrying about the situation or the circumstances, whether you're going to make it or miss it."

This can show up in technique, according to kicking instructor Chris Sailer, who has worked with Fairbairn.

"When you have confidence in what you're doing, your body stays aligned," Sailer said. "You're not pulling away so quickly. Your full base is underneath you when you make contact (with the ball)."

Neuheisel is the one who tries to keep Fairbairn steady. He'll untie his shoes, pull down his sock or crack a joke. Whatever works.

"He's always tense," Neuheisel said. "He's a perfectionist."

Whatever the secret, it's worked.

Fairbairn's 60-yarder last week was the longest field goal any player in the country has made this season.

"The biggest knock on Ka'imi was that he couldn't make deep field goals," Sailer said. "Look at the irony."

QUICK HITS

Running back Paul Perkins (knee) and his backup, Nate Starks (concussion), are "on track" to play Saturday against Colorado. "I would assume that both of them would play," Mora said after practice Thursday morning. Perkins reportedly suffered a bone bruise in the second quarter last week against Cal. He did not return. "I was more worried about Paul earlier in the week," Mora said, "but he's done fine." ... Receiver Devin Fuller (head injury) and inside linebacker Isaako Savaiinaea (ankle) are questionable. Mora indicated Fuller would be a game-time decision. As for Savaiinaea, "we'll see," he said.

There's always a catch with UCLA's Thomas Duarte

Thomas Duarte, a sure-handed UCLA receiver, learned to catch at a young age. No one just handed over anything his family's home. It was thrown. Television remotes, magazines, fruit, all got tossed around.

"We were moving one time and I had a box of stuff come at me," Duarte said. "That was kind of weird."

Timothy Duarte, his father, was a high school running back and linebacker. Duarte's uncles, Tom and Jim, were high school quarterbacks.

"You never just handed someone something," Thomas Duarte said. "It was thrown and caught."

Duarte, a junior, is 6 feet 2, 225 pounds, making him a tough physical matchup for defensive backs. He also has deceptive speed.

His sure hands and precision route running make him a favorite target for Josh Rosen, UCLA's freshman quarterback.

Duarte has 46 receptions for 666 yards and a team-best eight touchdowns.

"This is what I always thought he would be, the prototype for that flex tight end," said Noel Mazzone, UCLA's offensive coordinator. "That's what I saw when we signed him."

Mazzone said the last player he coached to fit that mold was Gerrell Robinson at Arizona State. Robinson spent the last four seasons in the NFL.

"Thomas has the same body type and the same ability to catch balls," Mazzone said.

Mazzone can thank Duarte's kin for those skills.

Playing football was a given in the Duarte family. His father and two uncles played at Fullerton Troy High. His grandfather also played football.

Duarte's career started in a flag football league when he was 4, but his training began almost from birth.

"I always remember catching balls," Duarte said. "My dad and uncles would always play catch with me. There was something about running and catching balls that fascinated me."

Duarte also delved into the science of running routes, parlaying that into 58 receptions for 1,025 yards and 17 touchdowns as a senior at Santa Ana Mater Dei High.

"He is tremendous at setting guys up in man [coverage] and finding the openings in a zone," UCLA Coach Jim Mora said. "He's smooth."

"Smooth" is Duarte's nickname at UCLA.

"Everything is this smooth operation with him," receiver Jordan Payton said. "He's not pushing himself by being fanatical. He just gets in and out calmly. His emotions are balanced."

Payton saw that when he hosted Duarte on his official recruiting visit.

"I can't remember any stories about him because he never really said much," Payton said. "I kept asking him, 'You all right? You good?' because he didn't talk."

Duarte still doesn't talk much. He just snags passes.

His numbers were low the first two seasons as he battled recurring hamstring issues. Those problems have not surfaced this season, and Duarte has topped 100 receiving yards three times in the last five games.

Rosen caught on to Duarte's skills early.

"A quarterback wants a big guy over the middle that is going to be where he is supposed to be," Mora said. "That's what Thomas does."

Duarte's most memorable catch of the season might have come against Arizona in UCLA's fourth game. Running full tilt, he reached for a zip-line pass from Rosen with his right hand and tipped it to himself. He then bounced off one defender and bulled over two more for a 35-yard

touchdown.

"He has the two qualities you need as a receiver," Mazzone said. "He gets open and he catches everything."

In the Duarte household, you had to.
